### Island Doctor Participates In Breast Cancer Experiments

In a recent issue of the Canadian Medical Journal reference is made to a simple clinical test for breast cancer being carried out by three Montreal doctors.

Among the physicians making the tests is Dr. A.L. Saunders, son of Mr. and Mrs. L.W. Saunders, City.

The article describes action of a drug heptaldehyde which together with skin temperature measurements may provide the long sought "simple reliable clinical test" for breast cancer.

"The chemical is found in rancid fat and was first investigated because it was noticed that no case of breast cancer was reported in Eskimo women whose diet contains a high proportion of rancid fat. It is reported that 80 per cent of a group of cancer patients experienced pain or a tight sticking feeling in the region of the cancer within minutes after the drug was administered.

"In all of them elevated skin temperatures over the cancers were observed to drop suddenly. Heptaldehyde had no effect on skin temperature when the tumor was not cancerous.

"The female breast is the most frequent single organ to be attacked by cancer and one woman in 20 develops such a lesion. At present diagnosis involves surgical removal of a sample of tissue for examination and only five per cent of such tests indicate breast removal is necessary. These surgical removals would become unnecessary if the simple test suggested by Montreal doctors became standard," the article states.

Mr. Harris described the work being carried out by the Division dealing with Trans-Canada Highway in the National Parks with an expenditure of \$11 Million and \$9 Million for other roads in the National Parks and Northwest Territories. He touched on the variety of conditions encountered across Canada, including the construction of a highway of sand along the beach in P. E. Island and also through the Rocky Mountains.

CAUSEWAYS  
This group in particular and Canada as a whole has been interested in the Canso Causeway which forms a link in the Trans-Canada Highway between Cape Breton Island and the Nova Scotia mainland. The Canso Causeway, however, was not constructed under the Trans-Canada Highway act. It is approximately one-mile long and cost approximately 26 million dollars. Including the railroad relocation.

Another possible project which is presented at intervals in magazines and newspapers is a causeway between Prince Edward Island and the New Brunswick mainland.

SAFETY  
Because of the rising number of highway accidents, there is much talk of building safety into highways. It is generally known in certain respects that highways of low standard promote accidents and highways of high standard tend to reduce accidents. Studies show that accidents generally increase with traffic volume and decrease with higher cross section standards, with regard to width of lanes, structures and shoulders. Accidents decrease with increase in
