NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—It is stated that Captain Berier, the North Pole Explorer, is to receive \$20,000 from the Dominion Government in aid of his undertaking.

—The new British battleship Formidable just launched, deserves her name. She is to be of 15,000 tons displacement, 400 feet in length and 75 feet in width, with a draft of 26 feet 9 inches. Her speed will be 18 knots. It is believed that she will be the most powerful fighting ship in the world.

—Statistics are said to show that young men do not, on the average, attain full physical maturity until they arrive at the age of twenty-eight years. Professor Scheller, of Harvard, asserts, as the result of his observations, that young men do not attain the full measure of their mental faculties before twenty-five years of age. A shrewd observer has said that "most men are boys until they are thirty, and little boys until they are twenty-five," and this accords with the standard of manhood which was fixed at thirty among the ancient Hebrews and other races.

—Hall Caine, when in New York, recently visited Chinatown and in the course of his remarks about it said: "Whether opium is a more demoralizing drug than alcohol is a question I cannot determine. Certainly a cursory glance would not lead me to that conclusion. Bleared eyes and degraded faces are certainly to be seen in Chinatown, but they do not compare unfavorably with the utterly demoralized faces to be found around drinking saloons. In short, I see nothing here to justify the conclusion that if alcohol were entirely prohibited by your laws, and the opium to take its place with the sanction of the law in defiance of it, your population would be more entirely debased."

NOTES.

The Local Government packet schooner Swallow, Captain Finlayson, plied between Charlottetown and Pinette during the past summer and carried sundry merchandise.

The schooner M E Dooks, Captain Rutledge, Sheet Harbor, N S, shipped by Gillis & McLean and D Stewart 1,000 bushels potatoes, 300 bushels turnips, 100 bushels carrots, 300 head cabbage, 1,200 bushels oats, apples, butter, pork &c. Schooner Pioneer, McLeod, shipped by Gillis & McLean 1,000 bushels potatoes, 1,000 bushels oats, 300 bushels turnips, 500 head cabbage, 300 bushels carrots and mangels. This is the Pioneer's first trip during the summer. She was overhauled and remodelled throughout and while laying and loading at the wharf she was broken badly which kept her crew at the pumps and fears were entertained that she would not reach her port of destination. Glace Bay, G B, schooner, Swallow, Finlayson, 1000 bushels potatoes, 500 bushels oats and sundry other articles shipped by Capt McKenzie, Flai River for Picton. Schooner E W Crozier, Capt McDougall and the schooner Isabella, Capt McInnis, the former is loading at Pinette and the latter at McAulay's. The amount of their shipment will be given in a future issue.

It must be remembered that Captain Finlayson, owner of the schooner Swallow, is under a grant from the Local Government to make weekly trips between Charlottetown and Pinette and is giving general satisfaction to the community at large.

Our Post Office is presided over by Mr A F McDonald, who is an obliging and courteous official and is therefore a thorough Conservative in politics. 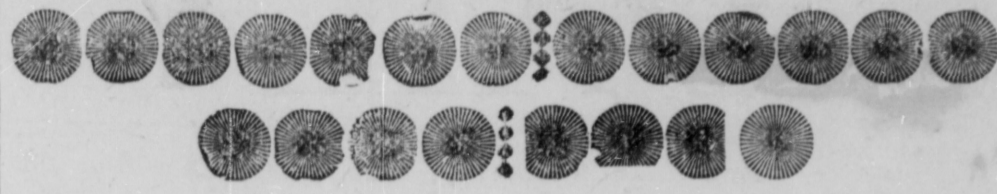

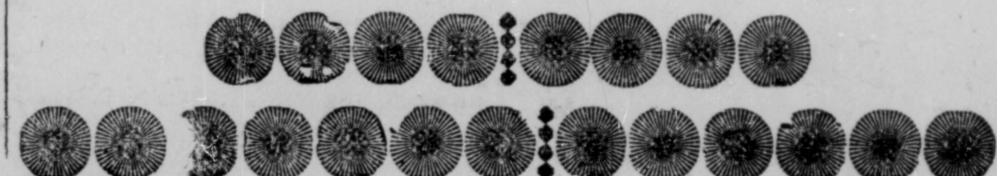
