## OLDER BOYS' PARLIAMENT OPENED

The formal opening of the second session of the Older Boys' Model Parliament for Prince Edward Island took place at 8.45 last night within the historic precincts of the Legislative Chamber of the Province.

Following the administering of the oath of allegiance by the Chaplain, Rev. G.H. Christie and the election of the Speaker, His Honour Lt. Governor T.W.L. Prowse, entered the House accompanied by his three aids, from the Armed Forces: Commander J.N. Kenny, R.C.N.R. Lt. Col. A.W. Rogers, E.D., and W.C. Alan MacMillan, R.C.A.F. and his secretary, Surg. Cdr. L.E. Prowse.

His Honour, after reading the Speech from the Throne, retired and the routine business of the session was entered upon by the members.

from 3 1/2 million at the close of the war to 10 per cent of this figure within a year Britain cut her 1 1/2 million troops down to less than 200,000. Canada pulled all her 300,000 men home while Russia stayed strong with 175 Divisions. Thus our voice was reduced to a mere croak and whisper while Russia stayed strong strident and brazen for she held the initiative.

**RE-ARMAMENT RECOVERY** "We were recovering from this by our re-armament now in its fifth year and it was significant that the two Russian comics Krushchev and Bulganin were coming to London next week - we were not waiting on them at Moscow", continued Mr. Fullerton.

**Cape Breton Causeway.** The S.S. Madgalen left the Magdalen Islands yesterday and was headed for Charlottetown, and with a five mile gate in the ice off East Point, it wasn't considered that she would have much difficulty in making this port. The Walter E. Foster was sighted breaking her way into Caraquez Harbor and was experiencing difficulty due to heavy board ice off Shipwreck Point, for which two sealers were headed. Other herds were also seen along the Cape Breton coast.

## J. L. CHAISSON Choir Leader Died Friday

Joseph Leo Chaisson, 51, secretary of Education with the Provincial Department of Education and choir director at St. Dunstan's Basilica died suddenly at eight o'clock Friday morning in the Charlottetown Hospital. Death followed a heart seizure about one hour earlier on the steps of the Basilica.

The late Mr. Chaisson, who assumed direction of the Basilica choir following the death of W. J. Brown in August 1948, was on his way to sing the 7 o'clock Mass when he collapsed. He was immediately rushed to hospital but he failed to rally, despite every medical effort to save him.

A highly popular and most efficient government employee, Mr. Chaisson joined the Department of Education in 1945. He was purchasing agent at The Vocational School.

In May 1948 he was transferred to the department's main office in the Provincial Building, where he became assistant secretary of education in 1948. He held until March 31 of this year when he was promoted to the position of secretary of Education.

In addition to this, the late Mr. Chaisson was secretary of the Teachers' Superannuation Commission.

Mr. Chaisson saw service with the non-Permanent Active Militia from July 1938 to November 1940. On November 13 of that year he went on active service and received his honorable discharge December 19, 1945. During his five years of active service, he served in Canada and Europe, attaining the rank of Quartermaster Sgt. Major with the 1st Canadian Brigade.

**CITATION** He received a citation when overseas from Field Marshal Montgomery "for outstanding service beyond the call of duty".

Before the war years, he was employed with the Patriot Publishing Co. Brady Footwear and the Currie Shoe Company. A talented musician, the late Mr. Chaisson was interested in choir and band work since his early boyhood. His service at St. Dunstan's Basilica as a choir member extends over 40 years. He was a valued member of the League of the Cross band and held office in that organization when it was active in the late twenties.

Until recently he was a member of the Reece Band. On several occasions he directed the production of stage presentations.

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## Maritime Premiers Call For New Study Of Fiscal Needs

(By Don Hoyt, Canadian Press Staff Writer) SACKVILLE, N. B. (CP)—The three Maritime premiers have called for a new study of their province's fiscal needs. Progressive Conservative Premier Hugh John Flemming of New Brunswick and Liberal Premier Henry Hawks of Nova Scotia and Alex Matheson of Prince Edward Island said in discussion at a Mount Allison University radio forum here that such a study is long overdue. The panel discussion, for broadcast Friday night, was conducted

by Dr. W. S. H. Crawford, head of the Mount Allison mathematics department. The premiers agreed that the Maritimes have not received what they consider a fair share of Canadian prosperity. They want a reassessment of the area's economic needs as a basis for action by the federal government. They said there has been no comprehensive study of Maritime requirements since a royal commission investigation 23 years ago. It was not up to the Maritimes alone to prove they are unfairly treated.

## Two Youths Get Six Months For Looting Wire

Two young Summerside Men were each sentenced to six months in the Prince County Jail Friday, after both pleaded guilty earlier to a charge of stealing copper wire valued at less than fifty dollars property of the Summerside Electric Light Department.

The sentences were handed out by Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q. C. who presided in County Magistrates court, Summerside. The charges arose from theft of copper wire at Miscouche and Summerside east.

The case against a Moncton man who faced the same charge was dismissed due to lack of evidence; however he was fined \$100.00 and costs when he pleaded guilty to a second charge of failing to obtain a junk dealers license.

A party from Charlottetown was fined \$20.00 and costs for having possession of liquor other than in his residence while the case of a man from Baltic, charged with assault causing bodily harm, was adjourned until May 1st, after the accused pleaded "not guilty". A man charged with joy riding at Tyne Valley on the night of March 27th pleaded "guilty" and

the case was adjourned for sentence until April 27th. A woman from Miscouche, who is charging her husband with non-support had the case set over until April 24th. An airman paid \$10.00 and costs for driving at St. Eleanors without due care and attention
