Campers Brave Damp Weather

With the continuous rain the last few days campers in the National Park area have been using the one club's dryer at night and many have even brought their tents into town to dry them out in the coils operated dryers.

Eric Kipping, superintendent of the National Park, said last night that the rain has not noticeably decreased the number of campers in the area.

The single dryer at Cavendish is being used steadily to dry the soaking sleeping bags and clothes of the visitors.

At the present time there are 16 tents and 23 trailers on the Cavendish grounds and 80 tents and 14 trailers at Stanhope. While there were few campers coming in last night the trailer park at Stanhope is full to capacity.

And with the rain the tourists are using various methods to keep their gear dry and to dry it now that it is soaked. The kitchen shelters are being visited regularly by campers hanging up wet equipment as well as those intending to eat.
