Cruise Ship Burns, 400 Passengers Reported Safe

TADOUSSAC, Que., Aug. 14 (CP).—The Canada Steamship Lines cruise ship, Quebec, in which fires broke out late today, was still ablaze tonight in the harbor of this small lower St. Lawrence River town. More than 400 passengers had disembarked safely. C.S.L. officials in Quebec said the vessel is a "complete loss."

Officers Appointed For Special Brigade

OTTAWA, Aug. 14 (CP).—The army late today named three distinguished veterans of the last war — one only 31 — to command the infantry battalions of the special brigade group being formed to fight aggression in Korea or elsewhere. They are: Lt.-Col. R. A. (Bob) Keane, D.S.O., 36, of Fort William and Ottawa, who will command the 2nd Battalion of the Royal Canadian Regiment. He commanded the Lake Superior Regiment in the recent war and remained in the permanent army. Lt.-Col. J. R. (Jim) Stone, D.S.O., M.C., 42, of Salmon Arm, B.C., who will command the 2nd Battalion of the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. A colorful veteran of the 1st Division, he rose from private to the command of the Royal Edmonton Regiment in fighting in Italy and Northwest Europe. Lt.-Col. Big Offensive By Reds May Be Underway

(By The Associated Press) TOKYO, Aug. 15 (Tuesday).—Korean Communists today shoved 1,000 troops over the Naktong River in a new crossing on the central front where they have massed some 60,000 men for an all-out drive on the key American base of Taegu. The new crossing was south of Tuskong, 14 air miles southwest of Taegu. This is near the junction of the U.S. 1st Cavalry and 24th Division sectors on the river barrier. It was about 15 miles north of the attacking 24th's attempt to wipe out the 12,000 Reds who crossed the Naktong near Changnyong, 23 air miles southwest of Taegu. Plant Improvements Draw Many Favourable Comments

Voiced Appreciation

The 1950 Provincial Exhibition was officially opened last night by Premier J. Walter Jones before thousands of holiday makers joining in the celebrations of the Exhibition's Diamond Jubilee. The 60-year-old exhibition, growing stronger each season by virtue of improved facilities and increases in exhibits and attendances, got under way in ceremonies presided over by Dr. J. P. Lantz, President of the Association. Premier Jones, after reviewing achievements of the Exhibition Association during the past few years, predicted that in another year or two people might see a new grandstand and a tunnel underneath the race track so that cars could be parked within the racing oval. He suggested that a hangar should be built on the grounds that would house exhibits and competitors in the event of bad weather. This could be done, he said, by the Provincial and Federal Governments and Association splitting the costs three ways. He urged the people to view the exhibits during the next four days. "I am told that about one percent of all the cattle in the Province are in the barns here," he said. "These cattle are worth a lot of money to Prince Edward Island."

Civil Defence Talks Planned

OTTAWA, Aug. 14 (CP).—Federal and Provincial representatives will meet here within 10 days to consider the problems of civil defence, from sabotage to atomic bombs, and to clear the way for the Provinces to co-operate with their cities to get ready for the worst. Defence Minister Claxton announced that the civil defence conference will be held immediately after the meeting of Attorneys-General who arrive here next Monday to discuss constitutional changes. It is expected that the defence conference will be under way by Aug. 23 or 24 behind closed doors. It will allow the Government to make a big move in the vital field of civil defence before facing the special session of Parliament called to consider Canada's expanded defence program and to ratify the dispatch of ground troops to Korea if that is where they can best be used when trained.

Police Ponder Reports Missing Teacher Alive

TORONTO, Aug. 14 (CP).—Police tonight pondered two reports which indicated that Alfred P. Greene, 38, missing Toronto high school teacher, still may be alive. Two 20-year-old girls, who work for a weekly newspaper that employed Greene as a part-time collector, said they saw the teacher in a restaurant Wednesday, about 12 hours after his blood-spattered automobile was found abandoned in East-Central Rosedale ravine. The girls, Edna Jasper and Lois Jean McLeod, said they both talked to him. However, police said the girls later admitted they were not certain it was Wednesday they saw Greene. The other report came from a man who knew Greene. The man, whose name was not made public, said that on Friday he saw Greene step out of a late-model gray car on a side-road between Aurora and Stouffville, northeast of Toronto, and that Greene was being "bawled out" by a woman with "a strong, metallic voice." Further questioning, said police, showed the man was happy about whether he saw the coupe Friday or another day. Five Forest Fires Break Out In Eastern N. B.

(By The Canadian Press) HAMPTON, N.B., Aug. 14.—Five small forest fires broke out in Eastern New Brunswick today, District Forester L. D. Black reported tonight. Three were brought under control. These three occurred in the Clove Valley area near the site where Saint John's new airport is being built; at Chamberlain settlement, 15 miles from Sussex, and Flat Rock Brook, near Coler's Island, Queens County. The latter covered about eight acres. Another outbreak, at Fork Stream, near Pangburn, Queens County, burned across two acres in an area inaccessible immediately. Men were expected to reach the scene on foot tomorrow. Details of the other fire, near Dorchester, Westmorland County, were unknown here early tonight. An electrical storm without rain in the Hampton area late today added to the fire hazard, which became higher after recent dry, warm weather. New Brunswick has escaped serious forest fire damage since May, when large areas were blackened, especially in northern counties.

Garbage Piles Up In Hamilton, Ont.

(By The Canadian Press) HAMILTON, Ont., Aug. 14.—Garbage was dumped into the streets today in some parts of Hamilton as a wages-hours strike of 1,000 civic workers went into its 5th day. The temperature neared 90 degrees. Garbage continued to pile up at the rate of 90 tons a day in this industrial city of 200,000. The garbage-collectors were on picket lines, along with grave-diggers, waterworks men and sewer and street maintenance workers, who seek a general wage increase of 10 cents an hour and a reduction in the work week to 40 hours from 44.

Heavy Lightning Storm In N. B. Capital

FREDERICTON, Aug. 14 (CP).—A two-hour freak storm of thunder, lightning, hail and heavy rain hit the Fredericton district tonight. The damage included three transformers put out of commission, several minor collisions, chimneys knocked down, cars stalled because of wet motors and ruined gardens.

City To Install 150 Extra Parking Meters

The traffic question came to the fore at the monthly meeting of the City Council last night as the Council members voted unanimously to install 150 more parking meters and discussed the costs of providing the City with traffic lights. The time and place of the parking meter installation will be decided by the Council's Police and Street committees. Further outside the Province communications will have to be carried out before the traffic light question will be decided. Councillor C. M. Cox, chairman of the Police Committee, stated that the parking meter installation was another experiment. The fifteen meters installed in front of the liquor store two months were proving successful financially, he stated, as each meter was returning more than \$4 a month. Canadian Advertising Pioneer Dies Aged 97

TORONTO, Aug. 14 (CP).—Robert C. Smith, a part-time cattle-herder at 6, a schoolboy for three years until he started working full-time at the age of 13, and a pioneer in Canadian advertising, died today, aged 97. Chairman of R. C. Smith and Company, Ltd., he had kept his age secret for decades, hoping to reveal it only when he reached 100. His death at his home in suburban Swansea followed several months' illness. Brought to Canada from his native Scotland at the age of eight months, Mr. Smith grew up at Smiths Falls, Ont., at one of 11 children. His father died two years after the family's arrival. Police Outbreak Spreads In Britain

LONDON, Aug. 14 (Reuters).—Another death from polio and several new cases were reported tonight as the disease spread across Britain. It has already claimed more than twice as many victims as last year. Latest figures show that in England and Wales there were 1,388 cases up to Aug. 5, of which 135 were fatal. In the same period last year, 871 cases were reported with 83 deaths.
