GOOD SLEIGHING IN RESTIGOUCHE.—A correspondent of the Moncton Times writes from Restigouche: Winter has full possession of this part of the Province. The snow is about eight inches on the level and the roads are good. Board ice on the Restigouche and Metepedia makes it impossible to cross these rivers with canoes. Probably the ice will be a safe bridge for pedestrians before the end of this month. The water is unusually low in the streams for this time of the year.

ORGAN BEHIND THE DOOR.—Chatham Walk: The Presbyterian congregation at Redbank, over which the Rev. J. D. Murray presides, has bought a beautiful organ and it has caused a considerable amount of talk. It is said the Norwegian consul has recommended the captain and crew of the Hattie Newman to the Norwegian government with the view of having them rewarded. Last night an official enquiry took place into the abandonment of the barque. The evidence will be forwarded to Norway.

BOSS FOR ENGLAND.—The Sackville Post says: Murray & Co. made a shipment of 28 cases—600 dozens each—to England, via Halifax, last week. The price is moderately high there, and a paying business might be worked up.

A Montreal despatch says that Geo. Wat, the great egg exporter, has shipped 930 cases of 30 dozens each, to England since the 22nd inst., at a price which nets 22 cents. The quality of Canadian eggs is now assured in the old country, and orders by cable are being constantly received.

ISLAND STUDENTS ABROAD.—The following Island students are at present attending the University Medical College, New York: John P. Wright, Cherry Valley; D. A. Stewart, Brudenell; B. N. Johnston, Montague; George Mutart, Montrose; W. G. Burke, Georgetown; J. K. Dorsey, Charlottetown; P. C. Murphy, Bloomfield, James Handrahan, of Charlottetown, and J. McLaughlin, of Mount Stewart, are expected to arrive there about Christmas. There are between twenty and thirty students from Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick and several from other parts of Canada. Altogether there are about seven hundred in attendance this year.

BONE GRAFTING.—A very important surgical operation was lately performed at the Charity Hospital, on Blackwell's Island, New York, by Dr. Phelps, one of the prof. assers of surgery in University Medical College, and Dr. Kiley, house surgeon of the hospital. The operation consists in the engrafting of a piece of bone from the leg of a dog to that of a boy. The dog and boy will be kept bound together until the bones unite, when the dog will be cut clear. The case is being anxiously watched, and it is thought that the operation will be a success. The interest taken in this operation has revived discussion of other cases of bone grafting which is not very uncommon so far as bones of the same species are concerned. The only case approaching the one now under treatment in the Charity Hospital was that of a woman in Chicago, whose defective jawbone was repaired with pieces of bone taken from a rabbit.
