Miscellaneous News.

Miss Jarrett, of Maryboro', Oct., was so overcome with sleep about five weeks ago that she is still sleeping.

A woman who was granted a divorce from her husband on Friday September 27, by the Supreme Court of Rhode Island, married a Newport widower on the following Thursday, became a mother on Sunday, 7th, and died on Tuesday night, 9th.

The marriage of the Duke of Norfolk and Lady Flora Hastings is to take place at the Brompton Oratory on Wednesday, the 21st November. Cardinal Manning, who was expected to officiate, will be unable to do so, as he is compelled to leave for Rome before that date.

Paul Feval, the brilliant French novelist, has written a book, 'The Jesuits,' which promises to be a great success.

Gen. Corrozo has been declared elected President of the State of Panama.

The King of Abyssinia, in a recent battle, routed Meuelik, with a loss of 20,000.

Alfred Henry Thesige, has been appointed Lord Chief Justice of the Court of Appeals in England, in place of Sir Richard Amphlett.

It is rumored that the Hon. George and Mr. Gordon Brown have secured the entire control of the Globe, and they intend to form a joint stock company, with a capital of \$500,000.

It will surprise many to learn that the debt of the city of New York at the end of last month was three million dollars less than at the same period last year.

A writ of attachment has been issued against John McKinnon & Co., biscuit manufacturers; liabilities are under \$500,000.

The New York Times says an expedition has been organized to find six millions of treasure sunk near the island of Cuzco, Venezuela, where the Spanish man-of-war San Pedro Alcantara was burned, during a wild revel of its crew, in 1815.

By all accounts, money seems to be plentiful in Portugal, and the public credit in good condition. The national loan for the continuance of the railway from Minto to the Douro has been covered seventy-five times at the Exchanges of Lisbon, Oporto, Braga and Vienna.

The six steamships from Europe to New York, on Saturday, took heavy shipments of produce, notably grain, fresh beef, tobacco, hops, cotton, and five hundred barrels of oysters.

P. T. Barnum was nominated, Saturday, for one of the representatives of Bridgeport in the Connecticut Legislature. He has previously served in that capacity.
