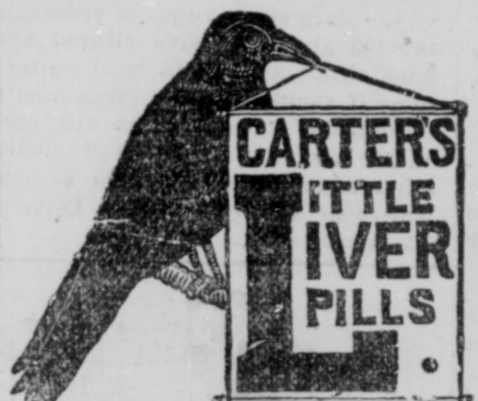
A Game Jockey.
