BREAKS OF THE SEASON—The "Sunshine" Pioneer says: Mr. S. M. Hicks, of this town, was sporting a parry blossom in full bloom on his coat lapel on Thursday last. This he found growing in one of his flower beds underneath the snow that morning. This freak of nature is an account of there being no frost in the ground. Mr. Michael McDonald, truckman, of this town, says he found new grass over four inches long growing under the snow in Mr. Bonner's field near the trotting park. Lawyer Wright was also exhibiting pansies from his garden the same day.

LECTURE TO THE MEDICALS—Dr. Dosey delivered his first lecture on physiology to the medical students last evening. The Doctor's opening remarks were introductory. He explained that man, although a member of the animal kingdom, however separated and specialized, is doubtless, to a remarkable degree, possessed certain properties and performed certain functions in common with all living animals, even the very lowest, which he termed the essentials of animal life, and also that some of these characteristic properties are possessed by the very lowest vegetable structures, and human physiology, that treats of man only, is a part of animal physiology, which treats of the functions and organizations of animals in general, so is animal physiology but a part of the wider science of biology, which embraces the organization and manifestations of all living beings; after which he impressed upon the students the necessity for them to devote their attention for a little while to the investigation of what are the properties and functions common to all living matter, and how they are manifested.

NEWS NOTES. Preparations are being made for a magnificent torchlight procession at Friedrichsruh on Prince Bismarck's birthday, the 1st of April.

The Earl of Derby is to visit Bootle on the 20th inst., for the first time since he succeeded to the title. He will be presented with an address by the Corporation.

The coal industry of West Virginia, which was chiefly instrumental in including the senate committee to take coal out of the free list and place on it a duty of 40 cents per ton, represents an investment of \$10,500,000, a yearly output of over \$5,000,000, and the employment of some 10,000 men at wages aggregating close up to \$4,000,000 annually.

Laws on the subject of betting are certainly in an anomalous condition in South Australia. A few weeks since forty bookmakers were proceeded against at the Adelaide Police-Court for carrying on their illegal calling, and were fined various sums amounting in all to about three hundred pounds, they having been liable to much heavier penalties. But it must by no means be therefore inferred that South Australia is a peculiarly moral place where no gambling is permitted; on the contrary, it is protected by a special Act. It is necessary, however, to gamble in a particular manner that is to say, by means of a totalisator. Why a man is allowed to bet when this instrument is employed and forbidden when it is not, must always remain a mystery of which no solution seems possible. Betting in South Australia was declared by the Lottery and Gaming Act to be illegal in any form until the year 1879, when a Statute exempted "the instrument or contrivance known as a totalisator." Some four years later a "Totalisator Repeal Act" was passed, and the use of "the instrument or contrivance" was again prohibited; but in 1888 once more the Legislature decreed that the machine was to be legal, and so the law now stands. If a man wants to invest a sovereign, and does so at the totalisator, he is a law-abiding person exercising his undoubted right; if he hands it to a bookmaker, who does not work the "instrument or contrivance," he and the bookmaker are criminals liable to fine and imprisonment. So the Legislature in its wisdom decrees.

CHAMBERLAIN'S OPINION. Joseph Chamberlain addressed a meeting of his constituents in Birmingham a few evenings ago. He praised Mr. Gladstone for his energy and courtesy in public life and said his retirement could only be deplored by political friends and foes alike. He said he had been asked repeatedly in the last few days whether the Liberal Unionists were ready to resign in support of the great Liberal party. This question he was unable to answer. He had noticed a widespread impression that Lord Rosebery was likely to reverse Mr. Gladstone's policy, and he was glad to hear that the Liberal party would remain unchanged, that the home rule would still be part of the Liberal programme, and that, consequently, he and his colleagues must continue their strenuous opposition to the Government.

A SUSPICIOUS PLEA—In a Washington county town a little while ago the county champion pre-icator was brought up before the justice for scaling hens. It was a pretty plain case, and by the advice of the lawyers the prisoner said, "I plead guilty." This surprised answer, staggered the justice. He related, "I guess you're 'I'm afraid—well, Hiram," said he, with a thoughtful pause, "I guess I'll have to have more evidence before I sentence you."

A YOUNG TRAIN WRECKER.—On February 23, a train from New Glasgow to Pictou, N. S., was derailed, the locomotive and three box cars derailed, and the engine was damaged. Since the occurrence persistent inquiry has been going on, with the result that on Wednesday last a young lad named Charles Brehan, aged 12 years, belonging to Westville, N. S., was arrested and upon being taken into custody he admitted that he was the perpetrator of the deed, having placed a deal on the track. The train was met with the engine composed of several passenger cars, besides box cars. The passenger cars were well filled and a catastrophe was only averted by the connecting link between the last box car and the first passenger car breaking, leaving the latter on the rails. Young Brehan comes up for trial next week.

ON CITY, Pa., March 9.—The Western New York and Pennsylvania freight train, bound for Olean, composed of tank cars loaded with oil and a few miscellaneous cars, ran into a land slide at Walnut Bend, about seven miles east of this city, to-day. Fourteen cars were piled up in a narrow space between Hillsdale and Allegheny River. The wreck at once caught fire from the engine. As the tanks exploded the burning oil flowed out on the river, covering the surface of the water with a sea of flames. All the train hands with the exception of Fireman Martin, who is missing, escaped unhurt.

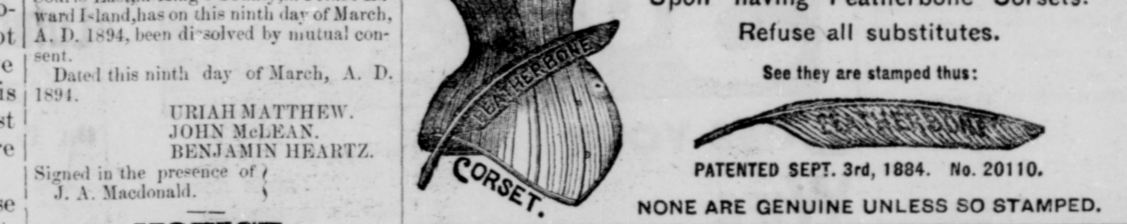
