Detroit Gets 5th Straight Win

DETROIT (AP)—Alex Delvecchio's two goals paced Detroit Red Wings to their fifth straight victory Thursday night as Detroit retained second place in the National Hockey League by defeating Chicago Black Hawks 3-2.

Delvecchio set up his own goals both times by stealing the puck from the Hawks in their own zone and then beating goalie Glenn Hall.

Delvecchio got the opener, his eighth of the year, while Detroit was shorthanded. He took a pass from Pierre Pilote and beat Hall from 30 feet out.

Norm Ullman provided a 2-0 lead with a 10-foot backhand after he and Don Poile broke down on a two-man sweep.

Pilote denied Terry Sawchuk with a 15-footer but Delvecchio regained a two-goal lead a few minutes later after stealing the puck from Eddie Kachur to earn himself a 10-foot straight on finish.

Chicago managed only one goal by Ron Murphy out of a scramble at 9:31 of the final period. Twice Sawchuk made saves on Eddie Litzenberger who apparently had the tying goal.

HALL IS YANKED
 Hall was pulled for the final 14 seconds and Gordie Howe, back in the lineup after his one-game absence with injuries, hit the open net. The goal was nullified by an offside ruling.

The victory kept Detroit one point ahead of third place New York while Chicago stayed in the cellar.

Royals Defeat Ramblers, Are Tied For Top Spot

The Charlottetown Royals moved into a first-place tie with Amherst in the Maritime Senior Hockey League by blasting the Ramblers 8-1 last night at the Sports Arena.

The Ramblers lost the services of their regular goalie, "Tuffy" Steeves early in the first period. It was later learned that he had suffered a bad sprain to his left hand. Bobby Dillon, star goalie with the Summerside Aces, was called into take over net-minding duties for the Ramblers.

A brawl broke out in the last second of play in the final period with Willie Dunn of the Royals requiring seven stitches in his head resulting from a blow of a stick wielded by MacKinnon of Amherst.

Most of the large crowd in attendance stormed onto the ice and for a while the arena was completely over-run with angry hockey fans. The fight started when Dunn and MacKinnon tangled on the boards during the dying seconds of the game. Dunn took a swipe at MacKinnon with his stick but the intended blow fell short of its mark and broke against the boards. MacKinnon took advantage of this mishap to bring his stick down hard on Dunn's head and almost rendered the plucky player unconscious.

People from both sides of the rink advanced on the fighting scene and soon fans and players were in the middle of the rousing battle. The Amherst players retreated to their dressing room followed by threats, and refuse thrown by the aroused fans.

Dunn was removed to the Royals' dressing room where he rested until a doctor could be summoned. Later he was taken to the Sports Arena office to be treated by Doctor Leo Kilorn.

Seven stitches were placed in his head while outside the office, the police were breaking up the crowd and restoring order. Dunn was later allowed to return to his home.

The Royals jumped into an early lead seconds after Steeves had been replaced by Dillon with Merrill Pineau doing the honors. Angie Carroll gave the Royals a two goal lead a little over a minute later with help from Skip Carver and Pineau.

The Ramblers got that one back

at 8:17 with Lou Kiley scoring on a hard shot that Doyle didn't have much chance on. Lloyd Shepherd put the Royals ahead 3-1 five minutes later with help from Art Perry and Buck Whitlock ended the scoring in the first period with a goal at 19:59.

The goal Whitlock collected was his first of three and seemed to go in the net and out through a hole in the side. The Ramblers argued that it was not a goal but the decision went against them.

The Amherst team seemed to come alive in the second period and buzzed around Thane Doyle most of the period, but the Amherst rally was all in vain as time and time again Doyle made great saves to thwart scoring attempts. He was credited with 12 saves in this period and 29 in the whole game.

Whitlock scored his second goal of the game late in the period to give the Royals a 5-1 lead. Amherst pressed hard in the late stages of the period but were again stopped cold by the superb stopping of Doyle.

Allie Carver scored about the middle of the final stanza and Buck Whitlock and Merrill Pineau soon followed. A small fight broke out about the 10 minute mark in the period with first Buck Whitlock and Lou Kiley mixing things up and then Ralph Josey and Furze doing battle. Josey was in the sin bin three times during this period but it placed him only second on the list of bad men for the night.

MONTREAL (CP)—Dickie Moore's two goals, his 22nd and 23rd of the season, led Montreal Canadiens Thursday night to a 5-2 National Hockey League win over Toronto Maple Leafs.

Playing before 13,942 home fans, the NHL leaders were always in front and wrapped up the game with two goals in the last period to Toronto's one.

Bernie (Boom-Boom) Geoffron scored his 24th goal of the season and the other Montreal goals were counted by Andre Pronovost and Henri Richard.

George Armstrong and Barry Cullen scored for the Leafs, who were left in a fourth - place tie with Boston Bruins.

Jean Beliveau returned to the Montreal lineup after an absence since Dec. 12 because of injuries but did not figure in the scoring.

Canadiens outshot the Leafs 33-23 and drew four of the seven minor penalties.

Popein collected his seventh goal of the season at 17:06 of the final period after New York twice found the nets on unassisted efforts following Boston miscues.

The winning shot was on a passout from Andy Bathgate after Danny Lewicki's shot was deflected.

Red Sullivan tallied with the game only 1:23 old when he let go a 10-footer. Bathgate notched his 14th goal to tie the score 2-2 19:48 of the middle session when Jerry Toppazzini of the Bruins lost the disk in his own zone.

Lorne (Gump) Worsley in the Rangers nets and Harry Lumley, appearing with his fifth major league club, each came up with 26 saves.

Worsley was returning to the New York lineup to replace rookie Marcel Paille after being recalled from Providence. Lumley had just been purchased by the Bruins from the Chicago system.

This group of 42 men and 22 ladies organized by Finley MacLeod were entertained by Curlers at Glasgow and Edinburgh in Scotland, by the officials of the London, England, Curling Club and the St. Moritz, Switzerland Curling Club.

History was actually made on the trip. In a letter received by the organizer from Ronald Alps, Secretary of The London Curling Club, Mr. Alps advises that this was the first time that a group of curlers had crossed the Atlantic to curl in London.

On the way to St. Moritz the group stopped for a few days visit in Paris and at the conclusion of the curling program in St. Moritz the group broke up into small parties. Some went down to the South of France and to Italy. Two Gordon Welner and George Kennedy of Bridgetown, N.S., went to Vienna, others went to

Holland and the balance of the party with the exception of Finley returned to England, some going on to Ireland. Finley went up to Munich, Germany where he spent nearly five days then on to Stuttgart for one day and on to Frankfurt for two days then flying through London direct to Glasgow Scotland for the return home trip. All members of the group were back in Glasgow on Thursday ready to board our plane leaving Prestwick for home on Sunday Feb. 10th.

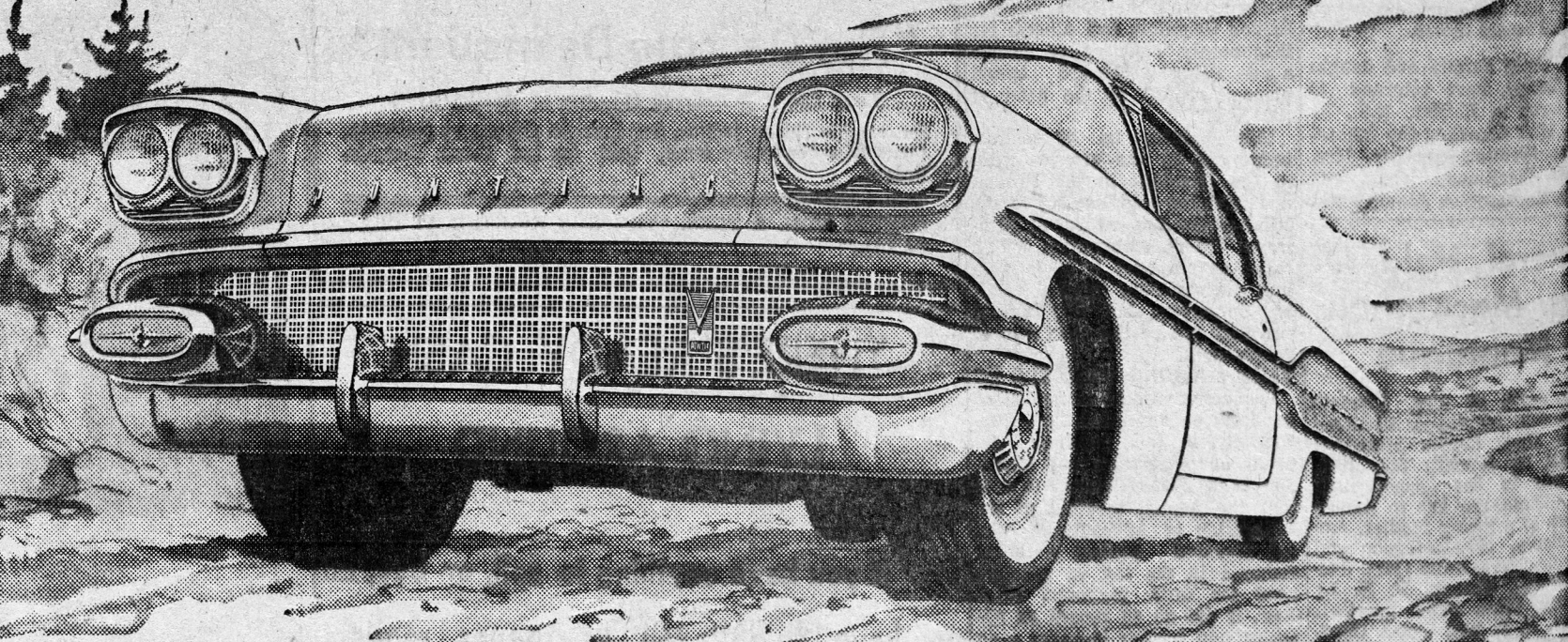
