## Bishop MacEachern To Be Principal Celebrant

The principal celebrant of night Mass. His assistant, Rev. Andrew MacDonald, will preach the sermon. The choir under the direction of Bert Tersteeg will sing carols. Organist will be Wilbur MacLellan.

After buying the toys the boy had been informed by his teacher that they would not be sending a note to the Red Cross since they had not collected enough. The boy pleaded with his mother to send a note to the nurse who was coming to the school the next day to take the toys back to Charlottetown with her.

Red Cross Officials appeared deeply touched by the thoughts of this boy. Although the articles only amounted to 30 cents, I am sure that they are toys that he would like to have had himself.

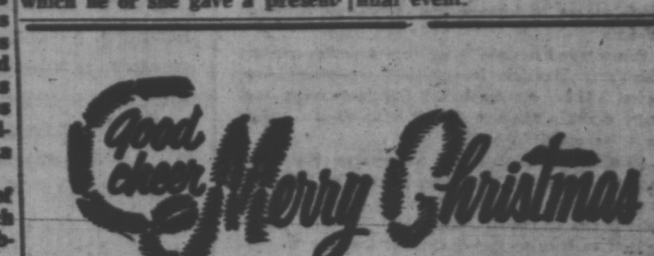
