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New Fashions Suggest "Period Of Transition"

LONDON (Reuters)—The new fall and winter fashion collections suggest that fashion at present is in a period of transition. This feeling is emphasized by the "wandering waist," which may be anywhere from close under the bust to the top of the hips, and by the fact that no single line has emerged this season as "the" style for the coming winter.

Victor Stiebel, who makes many dresses for Princess Margaret and the Duchess of Kent, seems to have summed up the unspoken sentiment of all London's "big twelve," the members of the Incorporated Society of London Fashion Designers, when he said at the

press preview of his new collection: "Fashion now has arrived at a stage when a number of influences threaten the established post-war

shape. We are on the edge of the second new look era and dress designers experiment with an alphabet of new lines."

The empire influence runs through all the new collections of the big twelve, with the tubular, tunic line also present in some form in most. But neither is featured in any one collection to the exclusion of all else.

The long-torso line of the last two seasons is definitely on the way out, but it has not gone. Examples of it appear in some collections while other couturiers feature a sort of half-way effect, with hip emphasis back or front but not both.

WAIST DEFINED
 In general, however, the "waist around the hips" effect has moved on, up or down. The seam, braid, ribbon or roll which marked the bottom of the long bodice may move down inches to just below the knees, to produce the tube or tunic effect. Or it may move up under the bust to feature an empire line.

In this evolution, the natural waist has become more clearly defined, though never nipped in and rarely marked by a belt. Belts are few in the latest collections. Ronald Paterson, for example, the youngest of the big twelve, who launched the step line—a step above the waistline in front, and a step below the waistline in the back—has only one, very narrow belt in the whole of his collection.

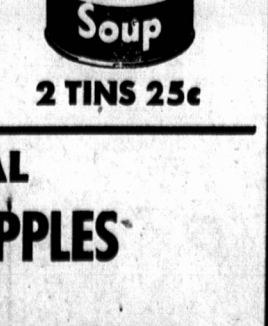
