Tignish Driver Fined As Result Of Accident

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN
Richard McInnis, Tignish, pleaded guilty to a charge of driving while his ability was impaired by alcohol and was given a sentence of \$100 and costs of 30 days by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County magistrate's court yesterday.

RCMP evidence revealed that McInnis was operating a motor vehicle not equipped with brakes or a horn at the time and he struck a 15-year-old boy who is still in hospital.

Mary Leona Bernard, Pleasant View, charged with possession of eight one-gallon bottles and seven twelve-ounce bottles of illicit spirits, pleaded not guilty and the case was adjourned to Oct. 10.

Burd Bernard, Pleasant View, separately charged with the same offence, also pleaded not guilty and the case was adjourned to Oct. 10. Both accused are counselled by Alexander Campbell.

Roy Leith Staver, Indian River, was fined \$100 and costs under the Gasoline Tax Act for operating a motor vehicle powered with marked gasoline. Accused in the court that he ran out of gas on the highway and borrowed some marked gas to get home. Magistrate MacDonald stated he had no choice in the matter but to impose the sentence.

Vandals continue to plague fisheries inspectors in the Tignish area, Warren Farrar, chief fisheries inspection officer, said yesterday.

Latest reports on vandalism concern the stoning of a fisheries department car Monday night at Minnigash. Damage to the car was slight, and Mr. Farrar said such incidents are quite common in this region.

Three fisheries patrol boats were extensively damaged by vandals last week. Fisheries officers also reported encountering roadblocks and bombardments of stones, resulting in damage to patrol cars.

Mr. Farrar earlier expressed concern over possible injury to fisheries inspectors. He emphasized that crew members act in the capacity of inspectors, not law-enforcement officers.

The RCMP is conducting an investigation of the incidents.

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
