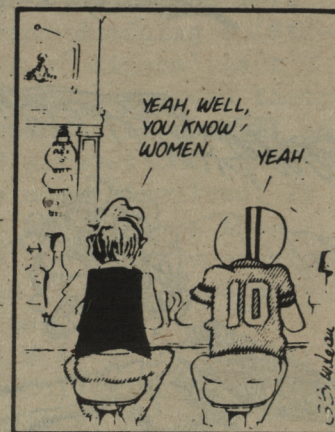
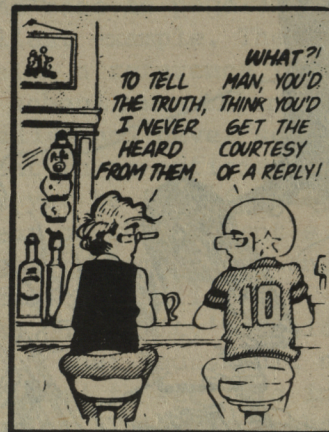
Dear Editor,
