LETTER FROM THE STENDIARY MAGISTRATE.

CHARLOTTETOWN, 14th Dec, 1876.

To the Editor of the Examiner.
Sir,—In reply to your article on the conduct of the City Council, in your issue of the 11th inst., in which you refer to me, I have simply to say that all fines imposed by me and not appealed from, are in every case, required to be paid instantly into the City Court.

When an appeal is taken against my decision I no longer have the power to enforce payment of the fine imposed. The Supreme Court alone can order execution to compel its payment; and this execution is issued by the City Clerk, who receives his instructions in the matter, not from me, but from the City Council.

DEAR SIR:—One of the ablest, most interesting and instructive lectures I ever attended, was delivered in the Lecture Room of the Wesleyan Church in this city, on Wednesday evening last, by the Rev. J. Latham. But it is not my intention to treat of the Rev. Lecturer's admirable discourse, but rather to deal with an incident in connection therewith.

Towards the conclusion, the Rev. Gentleman took occasion to pass a high compliment upon the Hon. David Laird—higher, Mr. Editor, than a majority of those who are familiar with his political antecedents would be willing to accord him.

The lecturer also gave expression to the wish that, before assuming the honorable responsibility of his present important position, Mr. Laird had shown a little more backbone in contending for an important educational principle, and also, that before surrendering his portfolio and vacating his seat in the Cabinet, he had stipulated that his place should be filled by an Islander—a sentiment which cannot be endorsed by every man of common sense on the Island, whether he be friend or foe, politically, of the Hon. Mr. Laird.

At this point in the lecture, an interruption, which is almost universally acknowledged to have been unseemly and ungentlemanly in the extreme, came from an individual in the audience—no less a person than the head of our Railway Department. After uttering something unintelligible, the Railway Superintendent cried out:—"The Island didn't need one!"—that is, a representative in the Cabinet.

A greater piece of presumption and impertinence, Mr. Editor, was never witnessed in this community. Be he ever so pompous an individual, or ever so important a personage in his own estimation, what right has any one man, under any circumstances, to speak for the people of this Province, and say what they do or do not want? Such reprehensible conduct is sufficient, of itself, to bring out in bold relief the blind partisan spirit of the man who has been guilty of it.

But the handwriting is already upon the wall. The day will certainly come—and that in the not distant future—when officials possessed of no recommendation other than a blind and slavish allegiance to party, who have been pitch-forked into responsible positions, the duties of which they were never calculated, either by nature or training, to fulfill, will find their proper level. And when that time arrives it will, no doubt, be found that the Ontario "baggage master" will be no exception to the rule. For such narrow-minded partisans as he, the political atmosphere of this Province is by no means suitable.
