THE WEATHER.—Fair to cloudy, with light to moderate winds; light local falls of snow or sleet, not much change in temperature.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.—It is understood that the Provincial Legislature will meet for the despatch of business about the 10th of April.

THE STANLEY.—The Stanley got over to Pictou this morning shortly before eleven, and leaves on return tomorrow morning at seven.

THE MAILS.—The boats with 53 bags of mail left Torment on this morning at 7 o'clock. Twenty-five bags were left behind. The mail special reached town at 9 o'clock.

POSTPONED.—Owing to the Forty Hours Devotion commencing in the Cathedral on Monday, the League of the Cross concert has been postponed until the following Monday the 20th.

LOCAL COUNCIL.—A meeting of the executive of the L. C. W. will be held next Saturday, 11th inst., at 3:30 o'clock at P. W. College. Committees for "Labour Bureau" and "Associated Charities" are requested to be present.

THE SCHOONER DELIGHT.—The three-masted schooner Delight, of Souris, according to a telegram sent to Mr. John McLean, of that place, by Captain Macdonald, was abandoned at sea. The captain and crew took the boats and were picked up by a passing steamer, and landed at Lisbon in Portugal. The schooner was owned by her captain, who belongs to Souris, which port she left last December for St. Pierre, afterwards proceeding to St. John's where she loaded with fish for Pernambuco. The rest of the crew consisted of Joseph Macdonald, mate, of Souris, H. Fraser and Fabian Deagle, of Rollo Bay, and two others, a Newfoundland and a colored man, whose names are unknown.

MILITARY INSTITUTE.—At the meeting of the Military Institute held last evening Colonel Moore, D.O. C., read an interesting and instructive paper dealing with the question of mobilization. He dwelt upon the importance of complete organization in times of peace, illustrating the point by references to the Franco German war, the late war in the Sudan and the American-Spanish war. He pointed out that no thoroughly organized army was the German army that within seventeen days after war was declared they were able to place 50,000 fully equipped men on French territory. After pointing out the different steps to be taken from the order "mobilize" until the fighting machine is complete in all its parts, Col. Moore spoke of the lack of equipment for the men of our militia forces and the need of an army service corps. In the present administration of the militia little provision is made for the speedy mobilization of troops, a commissariat department or a qualified staff of officers to direct all movements. A discussion followed, participated in by all the officers present, and several questions relating to the subject matter of the lecture were asked and answered. Before the meeting closed Colonel Moore was tendered a hearty vote of thanks for his able paper, which he acknowledged in fitting terms.

Local and Other Items

WORLD'S BICYCLE MEET.—The date of the world's best meet to be held in Montreal next summer are fixed for August 7 to 10.

MORMONS COMING.—One thousand Mormons are expected to take up farms in the Canadian West this coming summer. They will remove from Utah.

CANADIAN SALMON WANTED.—Harrison Watson, curator of the Canadian section of the Imperial Institute, informs the Department of Trade and Commerce that a German firm is anxious to procure large quantities of Canadian salmon, salted in barrels, to be dried in Germany.

CANADIAN BUTTER.—Between September 1 and February 28 returns to the Trade and Commerce Department show that Canadian butter to the extent of 118,573 cwt., was imported into the United Kingdom out of a total importation of 316,796 cwt., compared with 84,963 cwt., out of 247,009 last year, and 66,043 cwt., out of 218,305 the year before.

RECOVERED HER SPEECH.—A young married woman named Watsam, in Elmstead, Essex, England, committed suicide while insane. Her mother, who had been dumb for 23 years, recovered her speech through the shock. Physicians had frequently told her that she might recover the lost faculty by some great shock. Her daughter's tragic death supplied the necessary crisis.

THE LABADOR'S ERROR.—A late despatch says: The steamer Labrador was a long way out of her course. Skerryvore Rock is off the western coast of Scotland, in about latitude 56½ deg., and longitude 7 deg. How the vessel got so far north cannot, of course, be even conjectured from the information contained in the cablegrams. She should have made Moville to land her mails, but could not have done so, as the place where she struck is some sixty miles due north of that place, out in the open sea.

PROVINCIALISTS EMPLOYED.—It is pointed out by the Sun's correspondent that a large number of provincialists are enrolled among the employes of the Boston Elevated Railway Co., which controls the street lines of Boston and vicinity. Honesty and steady habits are said to be the successful recommendations which provincialists possess, which accounts for the large number holding responsible positions on the road. The wages of motormen are \$2.50 per day and conductors \$2.25.

HOCKEY NOTES.—The Abegweits-Victoria hockey match, scheduled for tonight, will not be played because of illness among the players.

The Crescents and Second Victorias play a return match on Tuesday evening, 14th inst. The Anchors and Y. M. C. A.'s will play on the same evening.

The Abbies are arranging for a quarrelsome hockey match on Wednesday evening next.

There were two hockey matches at Summerside last night. The Second Stars defeated the Wellingtons 11 to 2, and the Britannia's won from the Misouche team 21 to 6.

THE STAGE FREEMAN.—Referring to an Irish drama, "The Rebel of '92," to be played in St. John on the evening of St. Patrick's Day, the Globe of that city has the following: Dr. J. R. Foran, in the course of a lengthy review of the drama in his excellent literary journal, The Pen, writes of "The Rebel of '92" as follows: "There is no 'stage Irishman' about it, no caricature of the race, no degrading of the national ideal, no vulgarity, no burlesque. There is nothing in the costume, scenery or other theatrical appointments to cast ridicule upon the Irish race or upon the country.
