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Slain Canadian RC Priest Was Native Of Victoria, N.S.

TORONTO (CP)—Rev. James Arthur MacKinnon, 32, a Roman Catholic priest whose be-tattered body was found in the Dominican Republic Wednesday, arrived in the Latin American country in October, 1960, a spokesman for the Scarborough Foreign Mission Society said here.

He was to have returned to Canada this week for a one-month vacation and a visit to his parents.

Rev. Harold Oxley of the society of which Father MacKinnon was a member said the slain priest, a native of New Victoria, N.S., near Sydney, entered St. Francis Xavier Seminary here in 1955 and was ordained in December 1959 in St. Ninian's Cathedral in Antigonish, N.S.

After ordination Father MacKinnon, one of eight children of Mr. and Mrs. James F. MacKinnon of RR 1, Sydney (Victoria Mines), N.S., finished his scholastic year at the seminary and was graduated in June, 1960. He had received his earlier education at the Victoria Mines rural school, New Victoria High School, the Sydney Academy, Xavier Junior College in Sydney and St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish, N.S.

Following his graduation from the seminary, Father MacKinnon was sent for temporary summer assignment to Our Lady Gate of Heaven parish in Detroit.
