A PUBLIC meeting in the interests of temperance was held in the Presbyterian church at Souris, on Tuesday evening last. It appears that the number of liquor dealers in that town, notwithstanding the supposed existence of the Scott Act, is on the increase. The question more immediately affecting its citizens just now is: In the interpretation of the present Fishery Treaty are liquor sellers to be considered a privileged class? Neither merchants, mechanics nor farmers are allowed to furnish supplies to American fishermen to the amount of even twenty-five cents worth. But liquor dealers are being allowed to supply them with rum, gin, whiskey, &c., from a glass tapers. Is this right? Is it fair to the business men and the farmers to allow liquor sellers a monopoly in supplying the American fishermen? Were questions which naturally suggested themselves at the meeting. Mr. James Brennan was present as delegate from the Roman Catholic Temperance Society, a meeting of which society was held at the vestry an evening or two previous. After appointing committees, and transacting other business, the meeting adjourned to meet again on Thursday evening.

The Tornado in Ontario.

TORONTO, Aug. 23. A tornado occurred in West Ontario last night. The most serious damage reported so far was done in the neighborhood of London and at Ingersoll. At the latter place the roof was lifted bodily from the gas works, and a large chimney of the Bell Mill was thrown down on top of the building, completely wrecking it. North of London, many buildings, generally of a frail structure, were unroofed, trees were uprooted and chimneys were prostrated, causing loss which in the aggregate will be large.

Prince Ferdinand's Reception.

SOFIA, Aug. 23. Prince Ferdinand on his arrival received the usual offering of bread and salt presented with an address of welcome on behalf of the municipal authorities. The route he took through the city was crowded with people who greeted the Prince enthusiastically. An artillery salute announced his arrival, and a military guard of honor escorted him to the Palace. The city was illuminated and there was a display of fireworks.

Cardinal Trsche-eau to Retire.

QUEBEC, Aug. 23. It is rumored here that Cardinal Trsche-eau will shortly retire from the Archbishopric of Quebec, finding the duties too great for him at his age. Abbe Begin, Principal of the Laval Normal School, is mentioned as his probable successor.

The Lobster Regulations.

OTTAWA, Aug. 23. It is understood that the regulations relating to lobster fishing will be made more stringent to prevent the possibility of extinction of these crustaceans. The lobster commission has nearly completed its labors.

Cricket.

LONDON, Aug. 23. In the cricket match to-day the Canadians made 78 in their first innings, and 229 in their second. The Liverpool team made 238 in their first innings, and 76 in the second.

Messengers Captured.

BOMBAY, August 23. Natives arriving, report that the natives captured and imprisoned in Siberia a messenger sent by the Emir of Bokhara to the Sultan, with complaints against the Czar.

A Floating Expedition.

MADRID, Aug. 23. A floating expedition of Spanish products will shortly leave Valencia. It will visit all the principal South American seaports to open up new markets for Spanish goods.
