Mr. Osgood will spend not less than £70,000 to £80,000 on the college at Melbourne which he is giving the Presbyterians, and which is to bear his name.

The statistics of the Episcopal Church in Scotland for the year ending June last show that the number of members and adherents has increased for the year from 70,847 to 76,839, and that with the additions of sixteen new congregations, the charges now numbered 220 in all.

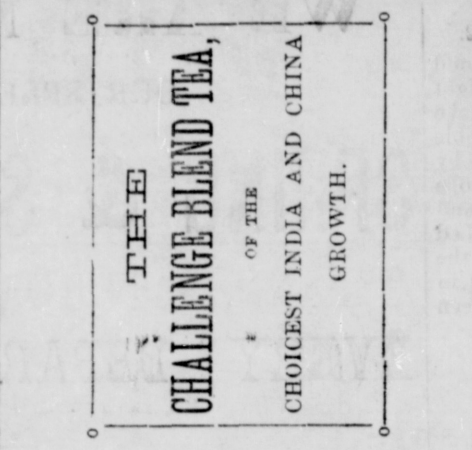
