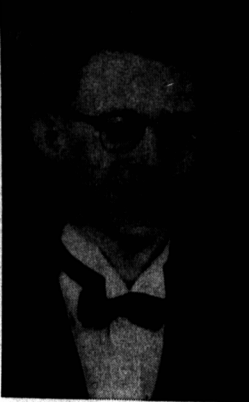

Nashua is Winner Of Preakness

BALTIMORE (AP)—Belair Stud's mighty Nashua let loose his tremendous speed in the stretch Saturday to get rid of the stubborn Saratoga and set a new Pimlico track record in the 97th Preakness. It was a comeback from his defeat in the Kentucky Derby three weeks ago. Nashua and Montpelier Stable's Saratoga had the crowd of 25,251 hanging on the rail. Jockey Eddie Arcaro decided to tackle Saratoga the leader from the beginning. They had it all to themselves as Clifford Moores' Traffic Judge finished third seven length back. Everglades Farm's Nance's lad was fourth. B. and Fred T. MacRae, of 10,721 lbs. of milk testing 5.01%. This record was high enough to lead all others in her class as was that of "Raeburn Trickett", owned by Earle MacRae & Son. "Trickett" is sired by Charlottetown Sir Roderick 7th and she produced 488 lbs. of fat as a junior three-year old Honor Roll. "Charlottetown Fair Fanny", owned by Director, Experimental Farms, produced 10,218 lbs. of milk testing 4.69%. J. A. MacDonald & Sons, North Milton, owned a cow which produced 13,542 lbs. of milk in the Mature class. A. MacRae & Sons owned three cows listed all of which had produced over 500 lbs. of fat. "Greendale Ruth", owned by Willard Prowse, produced 10,116 lbs. of milk with a test of 4.5%. five daughters of the noted sire "Gengarry Bit O'Fashion", as MacRae & Sons owned three cows bred by A. MacRae & Sons. A fine two-year old Honor Roll record was made by "Fairvue Blossom", owned by Andrew

Recalls Memorable Anniversary At St. Paul's

The Diamond Jubilee of the laying of the Foundation Stone of the present St. Paul's Anglican Church was fittingly referred to by the Rector, Rev. Canon J. T. Lynch, at the morning service yesterday. He stressed the obligation of the present membership to carry on the heritage that has been handed down. "You did not build, but it is yours to maintain," he added. Rev. John Caulfield was appointed Rector by Royal Warrant in August 1769 but did not leave England to take over his duties. Occasional services were taken by the Chaplains of the Forces. The Rev. Theophilus DesBrisay was appointed Rector by Royal Warrant dated Sept. 21, 1774. On his way to take over his charge he was taken prisoner at Canso, N.S. on Nov. 23, 1775 by the same two American privateers who had plundered Charlottetown on the 17th of that month. On being released a few days later, he proceeded by schooner to Charlottetown and the history of the Anglican Church on the Island began with this Charlotte Parish. The first entry on the Parish records was made by Mr. DesBrisay in 1777. Services were held during these years in the Cross Keys Inn, in public buildings and private houses. In April, 1800, work began on the erection of a church near the site of the present Post Office, which was demolished in 1836. The property now owned by St. Paul's Corporation was deeded to the Rector, Wardens and Vestry of the authority of King William the Fourth on August 8, 1836. On this site a new church was nearing completion for the sole use of the Established Church of England. The Church was consecrated by the Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia on the 21st of August, 1836, and named St. Paul's. This church was replaced by the present fine stone structure, and was consecrated by the Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia in July 29, 1896.

Polar Expedition Fails

TETERBORO, N.J. (AP)—The 1955 polar expedition wound up back where it started three weeks ago without having reached its goal, according to an announcement from its New York headquarters. The statement said plans are being made to reorganize the expedition for another try Feb. 1, 1956, with special provisions for fuel caches along its proposed route. Among the members were Capt. John F. Stannwell-Fletcher, expedition commander, and his wife, Mrs. Peggy Keenan Fletcher, who would have been the first woman to stand at the North Pole had the expedition been successful.

The Canadian Ayrshire Review for May featured "Clover Crest Roberta", the new all-time all breed American producer, with 17,601 lbs. of milk, 966 lbs. of fat testing 5.5% in 305 days as a Junior four-year old. It is interesting to note that this particular cow is a maternal sister to "Clover Crest New Design", the natural polled sire now being used in the Artificial Insemination Unit at the Charlottetown Experimental Farm. The dam of those two animals is "Clover Crest Martha R" with eight records which average 13,682 lbs. of milk testing 4.2% and 579 lbs. of fat.
