

A NEW, WISE, FORWARD MOVEMENT.

For a number of years the Charlottetown Young Men's Christian Association has made the effort to carry its work with a General Secretary, and the experience has been that it cannot be done in a city of this size. Viewing the whole situation the Executive Committee did wisely resolve to secure the services of a trained Secretary, and the effort to secure the money needed for this increased expenditure should receive hearty support. The Executive have shown their interest themselves by contributing \$150 of the \$300 required. It has always been a marvel to those who know of the work in other places, which has been such a blessing to the young men of the towns and cities, that Prince Edward Island with a wide-awake population of 100,000, and Charlottetown with one tenth and more of the whole population, should not at least have one man to champion the best interests of the young men in the person of a trained secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association. This is the more seen when one comes in contact with the young men as they leave the Island. Recently at Sydney a number of the most enthusiastic in praise of the work of that wide awake association were found to be Charlottetown boys. One of them, well known here, was introduced to the secretary on his arrival, who immediately found him a boarding place and otherwise befriended him. At the College Conference of students from the universities there were seven P. E. Island men, of a delegation of ten and some of the best workers in other places are young men who come from here. To a stranger it seems incomprehensible that a city of this size should allow such a noble enterprise as enlisting young men in service for each other to lack for opportunity of expression. There are many church societies that are meeting within the churches and the conditions of doing christian work are changing; but with it all there is the old need, with the increase of temptation and the unsettling of the home life. It is a significant fact that those who are most interested in the bringing of a secretary are the pastors who know the need and how fully in the direct work it is being met. One of the young men who went from Charlottetown with the first Canadian contingent to South Africa, and who gave his life for the larger freedom of that land, was one of the best helpers Dr. Barrie, Secretary of the Associations of Canada, had in his work. Had the second secretary who went with the second contingent been able, as was planned, to come to Charlottetown, he would have been received as in other towns, with a royal welcome. Are the young men only dear to us, and do we only see their peril and promise when the transport or steamers take them from us? What our young men want is a chance, and with a good trained man they will show that they can make an association here that will cause every true-hearted lover of his city to be proud that he had any part in the effort. No one surely can fault young men for organizing clubs and other things when there is no place where they may go from the street that is congenial. Men who stop to talk unduly over the price of helping young men when they know their deadly peril, and see the pull of the world from the higher things cannot surely have a full view of what is involved. The building owned by the Association in this city is the first Young Men's Christian Association Building in British North America. The men who erected it, in large number have gone into the larger life, and upon their sons and fellow citizens must fall the burden of continuing in ever advancing fashion the work so well inaugurated in the long ago. Every spot in that old building is fragrant with memories of men who worthily served the cause of Christ in the interests of young men. Will we be worthy of the heritage entrusted to us? If we jauntily throw over responsibility we may find that in the end it may cost some father and mother not only the amount of a secretary's salary but the dishonor of a son's fall. We trust that from our citizens there may come such a loyal response that the Executive may feel their hands strengthened as the move forward in what will mean to this city and this Island more than the putting of a steamer on the course to Sydney—good as that is. LORD CROMER'S VIEW.

Addressing the Cameron Highlanders previous to their departure from Egypt to South Africa, Lord Cromer said:

"Cameron Highlanders.—Your Colonel has asked me to say a few words to you, and I gladly comply with his request, although I know you do not require a speech from me or from anyone else to incite you to do your duty to your Queen and your country, and to sustain the reputation of the distinguished regiment to which you belong. You have been called on rather late in the day. In this respect you have been less fortunate than some of your comrades, who have already gone to the seat of war. But there is plenty of work left for you to do. You will be in ample time for the final act of this war. I need hardly tell you in what that final act must consist. The war cannot be concluded until the supremacy of British arms has been completely asserted, and until the British flag waves over President Kruger's capital and stronghold at Pretoria. "I now wish to say good-bye to you in the name of the British community in Egypt. We hope that when you smoke the pipes and tobacco which are about to be distributed to you, you will sometimes think of your absent friends, as we also shall follow your movements with the utmost interest. You carry our best wishes with you, and we hope that after you have given a good account of the enemy, will all return to live happily in your homes in Scotland."
