He called attention to the fact that at the recent International dairy show in Chicago, he was watching the 4-H Club members showing an exceptionally wonderful exhibit of Jersey cattle. The first class to come out was a heifer calf class, and it was finally won by Jester of Good Luck and on making enquiries of the breeding of this sensational heifer calf, Mr. Bremmer found out that it was sired by a bull bred by Edson B. Mutch, North River, P. E. I., and sold by him to Tennessee several years ago and called River North Jester's Gem. When the bull got to Tennessee, they changed his name. Only by accident was his identity learned.

Maritime Ayrshire Directors Elected

Fred F. Clark, Meadowville Station, N. S. and Frank P. Hughes, Peticodiac, N. Approve Two New Radio Stations

VANCOUVER (CP) - The CBC board of governors Saturday night approved requests to open new radio stations in Amherst, N.S., and Weyburn, Sask., and authorized two stations - one in Montreal, the other in Vancouver - to boost their power to a maximum 50,000 watts. The board's recommendations will be passed on to the federal department of transport for final authority. The board also approved applications to change share ownership and company organization of 19 radio stations and approved a request by CFP-TV Port Arthur, Ont., to increase the power of its television station.

STALINISM PROGRAM PRO CLAIMED

No Freedom For Hungary

BUDAPEST (AP) - Premier János Kadar's Communist government Sunday knocked the proposals from under Hungarian hopes for any general liberalization of its tough political course. It proclaimed a harsh back-to-Stalinism program. It also sent up a trial balloon for financial help from the West even while lashing at what it called "the dollar imperialists... who fight the government of workers and peasants." Announcing a "new program" for this revolt-battered nation, the government said only those workers, peasants and intellectuals who pledge loyalty to the Communist regime will have the rights to freedom. Among scientists, writers and artists, support is to go only to those who are not "enemies of freedom and socialism." The government portrayed the Communist party as Hungary's leading power and said it is looking for political co-operation only among loyal elements. The 10,000-word declaration - given a final polishing while Soviet Communist boss Nikita S. Khrushchev was an unheralded visitor here last week - leveled a treason charge against the deposed revolutionary regime of Imre Nagy. There were some concessions,

ector of Extension with the Dept. of Agriculture. This death was a great loss to the Junior Farmers organization. Last summer also the sudden deaths of Junior Colwell and Warren Muiridge in an accident brought sorrow to the East Prince Group and was a great loss to us all.
"In June the Junior Farmer's Federation of P. E. I. had as their guests a delegation of Junior Farmers from Ontario. They were Hazel White, Jean Petersen, Elliott Snyder and Glen Cornell. This was a return visit as members from P. E. I. had visited Ontario a few years ago. This group was entertained by C. K. Clay and the three active Junior Farmers Groups on the island - St. George's, Kings Co., New Glasgow and Districts, Queens Co., and East Prince in Prince Co. They were shown points of interest on the island and especially the farms, barns and cattle of some of the leading island farmers.
"Our annual Short course, usually held between Christmas and New Years was postponed this year and will be held later on in the winter possibly the last of February or first of March. Dr. George Fisher, Director of Veterinary Services on P. E. I. was appointed to draw up the program for this short course.
"During the year Junior Farmer's Directorship was named in the person of Mr. C. K. Clay but due to a lack of personnel on the staff for extension work, this did not prove very satisfactory. It is worked out by the Department.
"During the year the Secretary of the Junior Farmers Federation, Gloria Jenkins resigned and a new Secretary was appointed to finish out the term, this was Wayne Cameron from Head of Hillsboro.
"The Prince Edward Island Junior Farmers Federation outline three projects for each Junior Farmer's group to complete these were: 1. Lanes and Gateway Improvement; 2. Detailed Farm Plan; 3. Debating. A grant of \$500 was promised to the groups and would be divided on the bases of participation and completion by the groups in the above named projects.
"This year for the first time there was a special section in the P. E. I. Music festival for choral singing and square dancing. It is hoped that there will be a greater participation in this well worthwhile and enjoyable endeavour.
"In closing I would like to thank all our directors and Junior Farmer's work. All of which helped make 1956 a year full of activity in Junior farmer's work. Thank you."

Japan Is To Build A-Powered Tankers

TOKYO (Reuters) - Japan is going to build an atomic-powered submarine. A spokesman for the Mitsubishi Heavy Industries Company said the submarine will weigh 30,000 tons and have a submerged speed of 22 knots.
He also confirmed that the company's naval architects have begun work on the basic design for an atomic-powered surface oil tanker.
The spokesman said the plans for the atom-powered "subtug" call for the construction of a vessel 540 feet long with a beam of 69 feet.
The specifications dwarf the United States Navy's atomic-powered submarine Nautilus. It is 300 feet long and is rated at about 3,000 tons.
