Trout Are Too Soft; Upland Game Scarce

The current trout fishing season extending to September 30th has come under severe criticism of late. Trout taken this week have been described as being unfit for table use. The females taken were full of spawn and so soft textured one could break the skin if held too hard and were absolutely unfit for table use. One angler told me when he took his catch into the kitchen his wife chased him out and immediately got the "clean air" spray going. Even cats turned up their nose to some specimens. The females in particular were highly odorous. A day's limit taken at month's end could mean thousands of fingerlings less in the spring. Some claim that August 31st should see the end of trout fishing while others feel that Labour Day should see the last of legal trout fishing ... the fifth this season.

Clay Fights Terrell Next

NEW YORK (AP) — Heavyweight champion Cassius Clay said Friday he expected to fight Ernie Terrell, the World Boxing Association's titleholder, after the bout with Cleveland Williams in Houston, Nov. 12. He also said he was willing to fight Floyd Patterson again "if the public wants it."

"Patterson beat the man I picked and therefore is a definite threat to my title," said Clay in a taped interview to be heard on the American Broadcasting Company's Wide World of Sports Saturday.

Clay stopped Patterson, who knocked out Henry Cooper earlier this week in London, at Las Vegas, Nev., in 12 rounds a year ago.

"I can't announce the date," said Clay, "but I'll fight Terrell for sure after the Williams fight, then possibly Patterson. At the rate I am going I could fight them all in six months."

There's still three weeks to go before the first National Hockey League puck drops in regular-season play, but the limelight is flowing in the training camps and the ink is flowing in the front offices.

Concern is the keynote. How will rookie Bobby Orr, the Oshawa, Ont., junior whose step into the big time cost Boston Bruins a reported \$50,000 over two years, perform?

Will Elmer Vasko and Glenn Hall make their retirement stick, or will the Chicago Black Hawks be able to lure them back? Vasko, the biggest man in the NHL, says he isn't interested; Hall, one of the top goalies around, is sitting in Vasko returned to his home in St. Catharines, Ont., and said:

Lacking in significance is possibly the best descriptive phrase for Sunday's Canadian Football League clash between Argonauts and British Columbia Lions at Toronto.

The two clubs are doormats in their respective conferences—Toronto in the Eastern Conference and B.C. in the Western Conference. Neither team shows any promise of improving this season.

In other weekend action, the powerful Saskatchewan Roughriders journey to Hamilton for an interlocking contest with the Tiger-Cats tonight.

The only thing Argos have in their favor is that for the first time this season they will not be considered inferior to their opponents.

Toronto is last and completely out of the picture in the East with a dismal 1-7 record while the Lions have a 2-8 record.

But while Toronto is accustomed to failure after several losing seasons, the Lions have yet to become adjusted. It was only two years ago that they were the toast of the West, having won the Grey Cup.

MISSED PLAYOFFS
Last year, B.C. missed the playoffs, but this was tolerated because several key players were hurt. This season is a different story.

The Toronto contest is scheduled to start at 2 p.m. EDT and will be televised nationally by CTN.

Argos must overcome a string of injuries if they hope to return to the winning path. The most serious casualty is full-back Bob Swift, out for the season after surgery on torn ligaments in his right knee.

Because of his loss, speculation is that coach Bob Shaw will sign Art Baker before the game. Baker, a former Tiger-Cat, was cut last week by Calgary Stampeders.

Aside from other injured Argos out for an indefinite period, the walking wounded include Mike Wadsworth and John Vilunas of the defensive line and linebacker Al Ecuver.

ATTENTION HUNTERS!
This autumn, you must have a Canada Migratory Game Bird Hunting Permit to hunt ducks, geese, coots, sandhill cranes, rails, woodcock, mourning doves, band-tailed pigeons, gallinules or snipe.
The purpose of this special permit is to provide information that will result in increased hunting opportunities through more efficient management of the resource. The Canadian Wildlife Service needs an accurate method of measuring waterfowl populations. Presently, aerial and ground surveys of the breeding grounds in spring and mid-summer, and of the wintering grounds are providing some information, but not enough. Biologists need to know how many birds of each species are harvested, so that hunting regulations can be set to maintain breeding populations.
Variation in licensing systems has prevented a country-wide harvest survey. But now, sales records of the Canada Migratory Game Bird Hunting Permit, and the questionnaires to some hunters, will enable the Wildlife Service to obtain the information needed. The new permit must be purchased in addition to any required provincial licences. Purchase of the new permit is necessary this year in the Yukon and the Northwest Territories.
These permits are on sale now for \$2.00 at rural post offices, and at most city post offices. Check with your local post office to find out where permits are being sold.
