German Ship Loading Pulp At Georgetown

Arriving in Georgetown early yesterday morning was the M.V. "Reinhardt Lorenz Russ", registered in Hamburg, Germany, carrying a crew of thirty officers and men. It is of 1904 registered tonnage. Only eighteen months old, the ship is equipped with all modern conveniences and equipment including radar and radio-telephone. It is already partly loaded, having taken on 1500 cords of pulp wood at Point Du Chene, N. B., and it is expected to load 800 cords at Georgetown. The pulp wood is being supplied by Acom and Johnston, Souris, from their stock yard at Georgetown. When loaded the ship will sail for Rotterdam, Holland. Harbor pilots Temple Godel and Victor Rafuse brought the ship to berth yesterday morning.

Informal Dinner

Members of the Caledonian Club were on hand to welcome their distinguished guest and joined him in a small informal dinner. This morning he will pay a series of calls on the Lieutenant Governor, the Premier, the Mayor and the Bishop and will proceed to the Scottish Gathering at Montague where he will be welcomed by Mayor Bruce Yeo of Montague.

Lord Lovat was appreciative of being met at Moncton by Mr. Waiter Shaw and also expressed appreciation of the enthusiasm of the Rev. A. W. R. MacKenzie who had first extended him an invitation two years ago which he had been unable to accept because of business commitments in Australia.

This year, just back from South Africa, he had received a second invitation which he had been very anxious to accept because so many Canadians had been his guests last summer. They were present at a world gathering of the Frasers at his Inverness home of Beaufort. A number of them had suggested that he pay a return visit to Canada.

Pioneer Virtues

Lord Lovat stressed that there had been no unhappy clearances of Fraser Highlanders but that the general result of other such clearances had been to spread the spirit of the Highlander and of the clan throughout the world. It was kept alive in the Maritime Provinces and abroad generally in a way that is an inspiration to a Scot living in the Highlands. He felt that in this modern world the Highland attitudes of loyalty, brotherhood and clan spirit have much to offer. The clan is not feudal but means rather a spirit of one for all and all for each.

He thought that the transplanted Scot is apt less to dwell on Scotland's troubles but carried his traditions with him and adapted them to every new way of life, and in the past had played an outstanding part in building up the Empire. The qualities of enterprise and willingness to work together, with natural ability, brought them ahead on the little farms of Prince Edward Island as on the vast stretches elsewhere, becoming leaders in this as in other walks of life.

No Progress in Steel Peace Talks

PITTSBURGH, July 15 (AP)—While House-inspired peace talks failed today to make any progress in settling the United States steel strike, the union in its 44th day, and the United Steelworkers Union (C.I.O.) called its wage-policy committee to a July 21 meeting here.

The U. S. W. president Philip Murray summoned the 170-man policy-making group to a session here next Monday to hear his report on the status of the economy-paralyzing work stoppage.

In Washington, the Government freed for civilian use all steel not needed by the military. Production Chief Henry H. Fowler said the action is aimed at checking the spread of unemployment relief.
