Consider Co-op Grocery, Feed Store For S'side

At nine meetings held in rural halls in the Summerside area last night, those who attended were told that an option has been taken to rent a section of Smallman's Ltd. store, where their hardware department is now located, in which to open a co-operative grocery and feed store if such can be organized.

These meetings will be followed by a personal canvass of the districts today and on Friday evening there will be a mass meeting in the Summerside High School auditorium which will be addressed by leaders of the co-operative movement in Nova Scotia.

Meetings were held last night at St. Nicholas, Miscouche, Lot 16, St. Eleanor's, Linkletter, Travellers Rest, Kelvin Grove, Kensington and Pretown. The meeting at St. Eleanor's was addressed by Mr. Richard Hennessey of Charlottetown, auditor of the Credit Union League and Mr. Melvin Bridges, a director of the O'Leary Co-operative.

Mr. Hennessey told the meeting that all of the meetings were being addressed by members of the co-operative movement. Previous to now numerous requests have been received from the people of this area to open a co-operative store, he said, and now there is an opportunity.

He told the meeting about the option which has been taken on Smallman's present hardware department which expires on January 15th. He said that if the building is rented Smallman's will close their grocery department and their hardware would be moved to their former grocery section.

He explained that it would be necessary to raise \$15,000.00 in share capital before the project can be launched. Mr. Hennessey told the meeting that the co-operative Super Market in Charlottetown is doing a thriving business and has been instrumental in bringing food prices in the community down from 3 to 5 percent. He explained that members receive a rebate on their purchases and this year 3 percent interest will be paid on share capital and 5 percent on loan capital.

He also explained the Co-operative Act at length. Mr. Bridges spoke briefly and explained the co-operative set-up at O'Leary. Mr. Earle Cannon acted as chairman of the meeting and there was a question period during which many points were discussed.

The spacious home of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin MacFarlane, Fernwood, Bedeque, was filled to capacity on Thursday, November 30th, when the friends and neighbours of Mr. William MacFarlane, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman MacFarlane, gathered to bid him farewell ere he left for London, Ontario, where he plans joining the R. C. A. P. as a pilot officer. After all had assembled, Mr. J. Harrison MacFarlane called the party to order and the guest was escorted to the seat of honour, by Douglas MacFarlane. Then Mrs. Charles MacFarlane read a humorous poem composed for the occasion, after which Lloyd Sherry presented "Bill" with a well-filled bill-fold.

The honouree guest made a fitting reply. Rev. C. A. Britten, pastor of Central Bedeque Baptist Church, in his genial manner made some pleasing remarks. Then followed a sing-song with Mrs. Lang at the piano. Lunch was served by the hostess and several of the ladies present. The singing of "Auld Lang Syne" brought the meeting to a close. All departed bidding "Bill" good luck and God speed in the future.

The closing meeting of the Sewing Club, sponsored by the Women's Institutes of the Island was held at the hall at Central Bedeque on Wednesday afternoon, Nov. 29th., at 3 O'clock. This course has continued over a period of six weeks, and dresses made during that time were modeled by the makers. Each maker told the invited audience points gained through the instruction given. There was also a demonstration of junior sewing club work done by the schools of Bedeque and Central Bedeque. Some very fine work was shown. A social hour with guests, members and supervisors, was enjoyed. A bounteous lunch was served which was enjoyed by all.

The ladies of the "Half Century Club" held a pantry and parcel post sale at Bowness store, Bedeque village, on Friday Dec. 1st. The parcels were many and varied. They came not only from friends on the Island, but as far west as Vancouver, B. C. and also from many points in the United States. The demand for the "home cooking" was keen and the articles offered were quickly picked up. About \$30 was realized which will be used for village improvement.

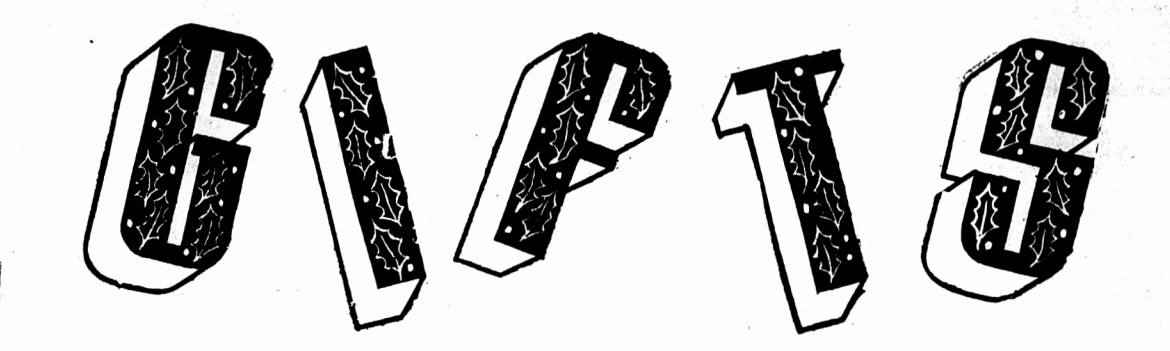
Bedeque Notes
