## Steamer Grounds En Route To S'ide; Refloated Hours Later

The S.S. "Orland" en route to Summerside to load 75,000 bags of seed potatoes went aground on "Tryon" shoals off Victoria Harbor early yesterday morning, and after several hours of uncertainty was refloated again in the afternoon, docking at Summerside about 5 p.m., where a long line-up of loaded trucks had been waiting for several hours in rain and drizzle on the Marine Wharf. Loading operations were commenced immediately from the trucks, in the advance of colder weather predicted for today.

The ship is being loaded by George Brooks of Kensington, of Kensington, and the Producers Co-operative Association of Charlottetown, and the cargo, all in 100-pound bags, is destined for Jacksonville, Florida.

Both large storage sheds on the Marine Wharf are filled to capacity with potatoes that will be loaded on this, and other ships expected shortly at Summerside.

## Cases Heard At Summerside

In county Magistrate's Court Summerside yesterday a man from Cape Traverse, charged with theft of gasoline had his sentence suspended for 12 months and ordered to enter into a recognizance to keep the peace for that time with surety set at \$500. The offense occurred several months ago and the apprehension on was made by Cst. James Maloney, Summerside R.C.M.P. Detachment.

A party from Tyne Valley was fined \$40 and costs after pleading guilty to possession of liquor (home made beer) purchased from a vendor.

A party from St. Joseph's charged with theft of a watch was fined \$30 and ordered to enter into a recognizance of \$200 to keep the peace for two years.

A party from Borden, charged with possession of stolen goods was remanded in custody until November 13th, while the case of a party from Alberton South, facing the same charge was adjourned until November 16th.

A Summerside man paid \$200 and costs for unlawfully selling liquor, while a man from O'Leary was fined \$1.00 and costs of \$15.40 for creating a disturbance in a public place.

Under the Highway Traffic Act, a man from Miscouche, R.R. paid \$2.00 and costs for using a converted truck to haul potatoes, that was not equipped with the necessary equipment, while a man from Alma was fined \$5.00 and costs for driving a motor vehicle without an operator's license.

## Alex. Spence, Draegerman, Laid To Rest At Springhill

Alexander Spence, draegerman, who gave his life in the heroic rescue operations at the Springhill mine disaster was laid to rest in the Springhill cemetery on Nov. 4.

He was a member of the draegerman crew which was instrumental in saving the lives of 88 miners trapped in a coal mine at Springhill. On Nov. 1 he was stricken by the poisonous gas of the burning mine and died a few hours later in All Saints Hospita.

He was the youngest member of his family and was born in Bo'ness, Scotland in 1913, the son of John Spence and Helen Wilson Spence. He came to Canada with his parents in 1928, and since that time has been a highly respected citizen of Springhill.

He leaves to mourn besides his wife, the former Barbara Louise Burns, R.N. of Malpeque, P.E.I., two children, Judith Bernice age 10 five sisters, Mrs. Peggy Frederick of Wellesey, Mass., Mrs. Mimi Spence of New York, Mrs.

Mary Spence, and Mrs. Nellie Spence of Springhill, Mrs. Eliza Sneddon, of Po'ness Scotland, John of Toronto, Tom and Jim of Springhill, N.S.

His funeral was held from his late residence on Sunday Nov. 4th After a short, but beautiful service by his brothers of the Knights of Pythias Lodge of which he was a member Rev. Mr. Mercer of the Wesleyan United Church took charge of the service, and also officiated at the grave. He was a member of the Wesleyan church, and of the miners union.

Alex was one of God's noblemen and his loss in the community and especially in the home can never be forgotten. He was laid to rest in the Springhill cemetery where four other flower strewn graves bore mute evidence of the town's sorrow. The pall-bearers were Harold Nelson, Bill Dobson, Joe Gillis, Jim Haymen and Doug Wry.
