POLIO INOCULATIONS in rural school clinics are available for infants from 6 months, preschool and school children, teen-agers whose 19th birthday doesn't come before December 31, 1957 and pregnant women. There is a series of 3 polio inoculations. The 1st and 2nd are given four weeks apart and the 3rd inoculation not sooner than six to seven months after the 2nd. Graduating exercises of the Class of 1957, Charlottetown Hospital School of Nursing, were held Wednesday evening before a well-filled Community Centre, with fifteen nurses receiving diplomas from His Excellency, Most Rev. M.A. MacEachern, D.D., Ph.D., Roman Catholic Bishop of Charlottetown, and one nurse a certificate from the School of Radiography. Right Rev. Monsignor J. A. Murphy, D.P., D.D., of Souris delivered the address to the graduates during the course of the program, the chairman of which was Dr. J.L. MacMillan, president of the Medical Board. Following receipt of their diplomas, the graduates were presented with pins by Sister Mary Irene, R.N., Educational Director of the School, and Sister Marie Monka, R.N., Science Director of the School.

Following the opening professional, the chairman remarked on the occasion being a presentation to the people of the Province of a new class of graduate nurses. "Each year the class is better," he said, "and this year is no exception. Nurses are made, not born and the type of girls attracted is of a very high calibre."

At the conclusion of the address to the graduates, two songs were sung by Mr. Frank MacIntyre and the Misses Margaret and Bethany MacIntyre, followed by the valedictory, delivered by Miss Lorraine Roche, one of the graduates. U.C. Presbytery Hears Plea Against Briefs The report of the Committee on Evangelism and Social Service made a strong plea at the regular meeting on Thursday of the Prince Edward Island Presbytery, the United Church of Canada, for a very strict observance of the Election Act in regard to the use of bribes. Concern was expressed over the inherent dangers of people selling their votes for material gain. A call was issued to all Christian people to refuse to associate themselves with corrupt practices regarding voting, and copies of the resolution are to be sent to all provincial candidates in the forthcoming Federal election.

The resolution passed by Presbytery reads as follows: "Whereas the practice of bribing voters with money and liquor during elections contravenes the Election Act and basic principles of democracy; and whereas the same practice tends to reflect upon the integrity of our elected representatives; and deprives the voters of a proper sense of public responsibility; Therefore we condemn such practices, and call upon our citizens to desist from using them and to obey the Election Act."

Education Discussed At Home And School Meeting

The annual meeting of the P.E.I. Federation, Home and School Associations was held yesterday afternoon at Prince Wales College, and was followed by an evening concert, in which member groups participated and K. A. Parker, Superintendent of City Schools, spoke briefly on the highlights of the meeting.

Officers elected for the coming year are as follows: President, Mr. Reginald MacNutt; Vice Presidents, Rev. Eric Robin (Kings), Mrs. E.S. Warren Queens and Mr. John Leuty (Prince) Treasurer, Mr. Austin Kennedy; Secretary, Mrs. T.M. Lohan; and Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Doris MacKay.

Following registration, reading of the minutes of prior meetings, reports of various committees, and general business session Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, Assistant Director of Education, addressed the delegates on current educational matters.

EDUCATION REPORT "People realized that there was something wrong with the educational system, and problems were not being rectified fast enough", Mr. MacKenzie said in referring to the recent concern with the question in the Legislature and the setting up of a select standing committee on education. The speaker then remarked on the findings in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, where Royal Commissions had been organized to explore the problem. Referring to Prince Edward Island, he said that, in his opinion, the report of the Select Standing Committee "met with general public favour", although the Committee had been somewhat pressed for time in order to effect a comprehensive report, and were unable to visit many school units because of the season of the year.
