THE PEACEMAKER

Mr. Campbell thanked the speaker. In so doing, he stated that Mr. Pearson's name was synonymous with peace. "In fact," he said, "outside of Canada, Pearson is Canada."

Mr. Campbell said the Diefenbaker policy was one in which "the patient was being offered a sedative while the doctor made no attempt to find the remedy."

Reference to a Guardian editorial was made by Mr. Campbell. In this he noted that the Island had first of all expected \$3,800,000 as its share of adjustment grants but later it was discovered that they were to be offered much less than this amount and it was only after insistent urging of Premier Matheson that the Province eventually received the two and a half million.

UNEMPLOYMENT

Mr. Pearson attacked the policy of the Government in their attempt to solve the unemployment problem. He noted that he had been accused of exaggerating the situation — of using the figures of the unemployment insurance commission.

"As a matter of fact these were the figures they always used when we were in power but I will use the lowest figures — those of the Bureau of Statistics. The last release was 500,000 and I believe that when we get the next report within a few days, that figure will be 600,000," he said.

"What's the best way of getting out of this situation?" asked Mr. Pearson. "I do not believe the situation is going to be solved by more spending on the part of the Government. We must cut taxes so as to increase purchasing power so that more people will be put to work. That is what we would be doing now if we were in power instead of running an election."

ANSWERS CRITICISM

Mr. Pearson said one of the things the P. C.'s have used as an argument is, "If you would do this now, why did you not do it last March?"

To this question he said the situation last March was far different than that which the country experiences today. At that time, he said, the situation was one of inflation, not of recession.

He said it was not the first time the Liberal Government had cut taxes in order to relieve a financial crisis. As an example he referred to the cut made by the Government in 1945 and again in 1948.

"Our policies have been admired in every part of the world," he said. "Our policy was to pay off the mortgage when times were good and keep inflation in check. By this method we have strengthened our financial foundation and placed our credit in sound condition."

SOCIAL SECURITY

In regard to social security, Mr. Pearson said the structure had been built solidly over the years. Some of the immediate measures which his party intended to implement if elected are, increase the age of children receiving family allowance from 16 - 18; give unemployment insurance to married women; provide education scholarships from federal funds which would offset 40 per cent of the cost.

In addition to this they propose to set up a rotating loan fund to enable students to borrow from. "Of course," said Mr. Pearson, "none of these things will be any good to us if we do not have peace and international security. If we fail in our search for peace, then all the social security we could introduce will not matter much."

AGRICULTURE

In regard to agriculture, Mr. Pearson felt that a policy which puts floor prices under certain products was not the answer. "What is more important is a deficiency payment which will make up what ever a farmer or a fisherman is lacking in returns during a year of depressed markets."

He cautioned that floor prices can affect United States markets and give the Americans the opportunity they are looking for by retaliating against us through tariffs on our fish and potatoes. "Nothing is more important as our American market and we should do nothing to give them ammunition to retaliate against us," he said.

P.C. Candidate Discusses Questions At Afton Hall

Mr. Heath Macquarrie, Progressive Conservative candidate for Queens, addressed a large and very interested audience at Afton Hall last night.

The chairman was Mr. Hector Currie.

Mr. Macquarrie shared his views with the people present on several political issues in the forthcoming election.

He referred to all the indications of a Conservative victory such as the public opinion polls. Magistrate J. F. Langmuir told the students he didn't regard their conduct as funny.

New Threat From Confessed Italian Murderer

TURN, Italy (Reuters) — A confessed murderer who boats of having already stabbed one man to death in a perfect crime" informed Italian police Tuesday he will strike again this week.

The killer, who signs himself Diabolich, issued his new threat in the same way as he told of his first killing — in an acoustic crossword puzzle.

Police worked out his puzzle to read: "Another friend will die on Thursday."

A similar acoustic led police to the body of Mario Gilierti, 27, two weeks ago. He had been stabbed to death in his bed. Diabolich's letters to newspapers and to police have boasted of the murder as a perfect crime." The letters claimed the dead man once was a friend of the slayer.

Unimpressed by the letters, police Saturday announced the arrest of Aldo Cugini, 24, son of a wealthy industrialist, on suspicion of the stabbing.

Plane Down In Atlantic

NEW YORK (AP) — The coast guard reported Tuesday a night that an unidentified plane was down in the Atlantic Ocean about 150 miles southeast of here.

A rescue aircraft was dispatched to the area off Cape May but the coast guard said it had received no word from it up to 11 p.m. AST.

First word came from the United Fruit Company's freighter S.S. Cape Cod which said it sighted the plane going into the water at about 8:30 p.m.

A coast guard station at Asbury Park on the New Jersey coast reported it had heard an incomplete distress signal from a plane saying it was ditching in the Atlantic.
