

New Rumors Princess To Marry British Air Ace

LONDON, (AP)—Rumors that Princess Margaret will marry a British air ace Peter Townsend, who was posted suddenly to the headlines of Brussels as air attaché and the third of Britain's largest Sunday rumors died down.

The People, which claims a circulation of more than 4,500,000, re-officially but one high court port talk that the pretty 24-year-old princess returned last week to her home at her tour of the West Indies no reason to believe them to be "more determined than ever" to marry Townsend, who is 40.

Deceased was born at Montague, P. E. I., July 30, 1898. He came to Saskatchewan in 1917 and in 1918 married Esther Scollinder. He farmed in the Madistone district until 1949. Since coming to Smithers, he worked at the Smithers Planer Mill and later at the Smithers Hotel for three years.

Surviving are his widow, four daughters, Mrs. R. Stenmark, Maidstone, Mrs. L. Gingras, Paradise Hill, Mrs. E. Beyreman, Watton, Ont., Mrs. R. Swanson, Waseca, two sons, Willard and Lyle of Smithers, a third son, Maynard, was killed in action in the Second World War in 1944. He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. C. Kennedy of Montague, P. E. I.; three sisters, two brothers and eight grandchildren.

"Worn-Out" Grains Still Favored On The Prairies

WINNIPEG (CP)—Despite attempts by agronomists and government agencies to discourage it, the "worn-out" grain will be sown this spring on thousands of acres of Prairie farmland.

Grains that have been of the recommended lists for years are still grown by farmers who turn their backs on the newer varieties.

In 1950, worn-out grains occupied 32 per cent of Alberta's acreage, 36 per cent of Saskatchewan and 16 per cent of Manitoba.

Dr. F. J. Greaney, director of the line elevators farm service said in an interview these figures should apply as well to 1955.

However, rec life was a parent to marquis that hardly stirred which, by 1935, was occupying about 90 per cent of the Prairie acreage.

But marquis fell a victim of rust and by 1935 it was removed from the recommended list. Some of it is still around, but last year it comprised 2.6 per cent of the acreage.

Marquis' successor was Thatcher, a rust-resistant strain and currently the most widely grown. In 1954 it occupied 63.6 per cent.

SELKIRK TAKES OVER

In newer, harder types of rust-resistant strains are pushing Thatcher into the background. Redman and Saunders have made considerable progress in recent years.

This year, Selkirk—the latest grain found resistant to race 15B rust—will be widely planted in Manitoba and southern Saskatchewan.

However, some farmers have shown reluctance in buying the high-priced Selkirk seed—from \$3 a bushel and up—and are taking their chances on old varieties, but not recommended, such as Garnet, Red Bobs and Renown.

Dr. Greaney said many of these older varieties are still grown because they are found to be the most adaptable to varying soil conditions such as exist in Alberta.

All grains are licensed by the federal government and not one licence has ever been revoked. There is no legislation prohibiting the production of worn-out strains.

The recommended lists are published annually by three groups—the Alberta varietal zonation committee, the Saskatchewan advisory council on grain crops and the Manitoba department of agriculture.

The recommendations are based on results obtained at experimental farms, illustration stations and surveys.

MUCH DESERT

AFRAID TO EXPERIMENT

Dr. Greaney said the continuing presence of the old varieties was due mainly to the fact that farmers preferred to stick with the strains they were accustomed to rather than experiment with newer types.

For instance, some northern Saskatchewan farmers still grow red wheat although it was struck off the recommended list in 1949.

Red life was introduced to Canada in the 1880s from Scotland and at one time was almost exclusively grown on the Prairies. It was popular because of its early maturity and good milling qualities, but as the agricultural basin expanded northward red life proved worthless because of slow maturity and its

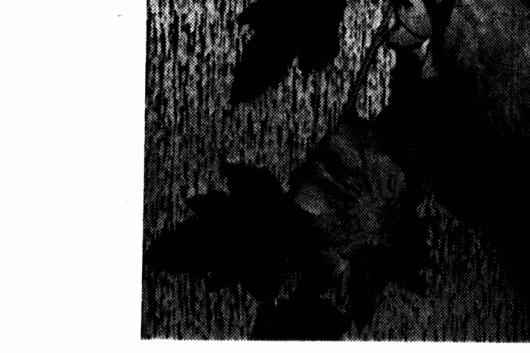
