

Film Council Formed In Georgetown

A meeting of the delegates representing various Georgetown organizations met at the Legion Hall, on Friday, March 6th, to present the opinion of their respective groups on the formation of a local Film Council. Seven organizations pledged themselves to support a Film Council and give a donation towards the cost of a community projector. At least two other local associations were quite favorable to the idea, and will be heard from at the next meeting.

It was agreed by all present that a Film Council could now be formed. Consequently, Rev. W. A. Paterson moved that such a body be organized. This motion was seconded by Mr. H. McLean and carried. Mr. H. McLean then moved that a committee of five be appointed to nominate a president, secretary and treasurer of the Film Council, leaving other offices open until a further meeting. This motion was carried. The nominating committee duly appointed were: Mrs. F. Delory, Mr. S. Walker, Mr. H. McLean, Mrs. A. H. Stuart, Mrs. A. Arsenault.

This committee nominated for office the following members: president, Rev. W. A. Paterson, seconded by Mr. H. McLean, and the motion carried; secretary, Miss G. Solomon, seconded by Mr. S. Walker and motion carried; treasurer, Mrs. E. Easton, seconded by Mrs. A. H. Stuart, motion carried.

Mr. S. McInnis suggested that all organizations not represented be contacted within the next few days and invited to send a delegate to the next meeting of the Film Council, when the balance of the new president's appointment decision of the school trustee's decision to wire the school for the use of the projector, and pay all expenses.

Mrs. F. J. Delory moved a vote of thanks to Mr. S. McInnis for the time and patience spent in his frequent visits in connection with the forming of a Georgetown Film Council. The meeting then adjourned.

"STORY OF ROBIN HOOD" IMPRESSIVE NEW PRODUCTION

RICHARD TODD STARRED, WITH JOAN RICE AS MAID MARIAN IN GIGANTIC ALL-LIVE-ACTION DRAMA

Buried deep in the instincts of all men is a quick sympathy with the rollicking, fearless personality of literature's mystery character known as Robin Hood.

Brought to the screen in a stupendous Technicolor production, Walt Disney's all-live-action film, the "Story of Robin Hood" offers a new interpretation of the hero of Sherwood Forest whose exploits at the head of his band of Merry Men have delighted lovers of justice and adventure for centuries. Richard Todd stars as the title character, and Joan Rice is introduced as one of the most delightful Maid Marian's of stage or screen.

After the assassination of his father, (Reginald Tate), instigated by the notorious Sheriff of Nottingham, (Peter Finch), as the Disney version goes, Robin himself is outlawed, and, with his band of merry rogues rebels against wanton outrage and unbearable burdens laid upon the folk of the region during a crucial time in English history.

Soon this wily forester, riding and fighting at the head of his motley group in Lincoln, Green brings terror and chagrin to the forces of tyranny which grew during the absence of King Richard the Lionheart, (Patrick Barr), away on the Third Crusade. In his bold sallies out of Sherwood Forest, Robin earns that repute which has carried his name as a symbol of justice through hundreds of years in ballad and legend, myth and dusty document.

Intertwined with the story of his adventures from the early sequences to the end are the threads of the romance between Robin and his childhood playmate, Maid Marian, daughter of the local squire, Earl of Huntington, (Clement McCallin).

In Joan Rice's capable hands, Maid Marian becomes a bewitching character. Both in her position as a dignified young lady-in-waiting to the Queen Mother (Maritta Hunt) and in her adventurous exploits as a young blade accompanying the minister Allan-A-Dale through Sherwood Forest, the heroine captures the attention and affection of the audience as completely as she captures Robin's faithful heart.

Two solid years of research for this picture supported the general out lines and the principal characters of the Robin Hood saga, although it is no wise intended to be specifically biographical. It was Walt Disney's purpose to build a magnificent melodrama of raid and battle, escape and ambush, romance and uproarious comedy, in an authentic recreation of time and place and men and manners in turbulent 12 century England. Using the charging action ad running narrative from ballads of Allan-A-Dale (Elton Hayes) the figure of the most famous of all outlaws stands boldly forth as a three-dimensional figure far more human than that cheaply rated highwayman who "robbed the rich to give to the poor."

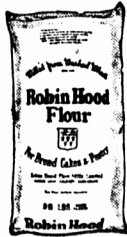

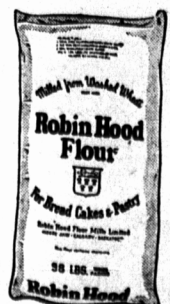
