U.S. Expels 2 Members Of Russian U.N. Delegation

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States Wednesday expelled two members of Russia's United Nations delegation, calling them "no longer desirable" because of their part in the sudden "re-defection" of five Soviet seamen. A note handed Soviet Ambassador Georgi Zarubin also chided Aleksandr Sobolev, head of Russia's UN delegation for his conduct in the incident. However, Sobolev's expulsion was not demanded. The note, made public by the state department, charged the two members of the Soviet delegation, Aleksandr K. Guryanov and Nikolai Turkun, had behaved in "particularly objectionable manner."

Anglo-Soviet Conference Is Concluded

LONDON (Reuters)—British and Russian leaders Wednesday night wound up their talks on world issues without any major Soviet concessions to the West. It was understood that Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Nikita Khrushchev offered a number of suggestions on disarmament that went beyond those now being considered by a current five-nation conference in London.

Carloadings Are Higher

OTTAWA (CP)—Railway carloadings rose 28.7 per cent in the second week of April to 79,142 cars from 61,512 in the corresponding period last year. The bureau of statistics reported Wednesday cumulative loadings to mid-April this year rose 12.7 per cent to 1,129,307 cars from 993,898 in the January-April 14 period last year.

MONTREAL (CP)—Jean St. Denis, 35, prominent actor on the CBC's French television network, was killed Wednesday in an explosion and fire at his small apartment in the centre of the city. Police said the fire was set off by a stove explosion in the kitchen.

- FLOOD THREAT EASES WINNIPEG (CP)—Southern Manitoba took a breather Wednesday as the flood-swollen Assiniboine river began to drop and the forecasters lowered their estimate on what the Red river might do this spring.
- MORE DISMISSALS LONDON (Reuters)—Radio reports from Warsaw Wednesday suggested that more Polish Communist ministers may topple soon in a major internal reorganization now proceeding.
- FRENCH SEEK REBELS ALGIERS (Reuters)—More than 5,000 French troops Wednesday streamed into Soummam valley—the "valley of fear"—where some 120 pro-French villagers were slaughtered by rebels in terror raids.
- SEEKS JORDAN'S HELP AMMAN, Jordan (AP)—Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold sought Jordan's help Wednesday on his United Nations mission to pacify the armistice lines around Israel.
- MAIDEN VOYAGE QUEBEC (CP)—The sleek, new Empress of Britain, the largest ocean liner ever built for service between Britain and Montreal, docked here Wednesday night on her maiden voyage to Canada.
- CRUISER DUE TODAY OTTAWA (CP)—The cruiser HMCS Quebec is expected to reach Halifax today to end a three-month training cruise to the West Indies, navy headquarters announced Wednesday.
- CONTRACTS LET OTTAWA (CP)—Contracts valued at \$19,367,643 were awarded by the defence production department and Defence Construction Limited during the first half of March.
- CZEK MINISTER FIRED PRAGUE (Reuters)—Gen. Alexej Cepicka has been dismissed from his post as Czechoslovak defence minister. It was announced Wednesday night. He was removed because of "shortcomings in the pursuance of his government duties," Prague radio said.
