SPIRIT OF THE SAMARITAN

Once I was told that, in addressing a certain group of educated persons, I must not assume any knowledge of the Bible. Also that even as familiar a passage as Christ's parable of the "Good Samaritan" would have to be explained before I reference to it would be understood.

In a conversation between Jesus and an inquirer of the Old Testament law was quoted: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Jesus commended it to the man for action and was immediately challenged with the question: "Who is my neighbor?"

But a Samaritan, as he journeyed, came to the place he was; and when he saw him, he had compassion, and went to him and bound up his wounds, pouring on oil and wine; then he set him on his own beast and brought him to an inn, and took care of him.

The bitter antagonism between the Jews and Samaritans gave the parable its point, particularly as the victim's own people ignored his need.
