Court First For Labrador Is Planned

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—For the first time in the history of the Newfoundland Supreme Court, a circuit court will sit in western Labrador this year.

The court will be in Labrador City Oct. 3 and 4, a court official said Wednesday. In past years a special lower court was set up to travel along the Labrador coast and deal with offences. It was presided over by a magistrate.

Indonesia Cuts All Links With Malaysian Federation

JAKARTA, Indonesia — Indonesia severed all communication links with Malaysia Wednesday, carrying its policy of "confronting" the new federation a step further.

The move followed the breaking of both diplomatic and trade relations and left Indonesia in virtually total isolation from the nine-day-old federation.

Postal and telegraph departments rejected telegrams from Singapore, one of Malaysia's main ports. Foreign news services operating here were told they could not transmit directly to any points in the new area.

Radio Malaysia short-wave broadcasts, previously heard regularly in Malaysia, made up of Malaya, Singapore, Sarawak and Sabah (British North Borneo), has been condemned by Indonesian officials.

TRADE WITH SOVIETS

Across Border Work Benefits Are Discussed

AUGUSTA, Me. (AP)—Canadian Labor Minister MacEachern conferred with Governor John H. Reel and the Maine Employment Security Commission Tuesday on the possibility of a reciprocal agreement to pay unemployment benefits to non-resident workers.

Reel said the problem concerns the matter of unemployment compensation for Canadian workers once employed in Maine lumber and pulpwood operations.

New Rail Contract Demands Coincide With Wheat Sale

MONTREAL (CP)—Canada's 100,000 non-operating railway employees are due to present their new contract demands in a special job security fund set up in the last round of talks that ended 15 months ago.

If the unions follow the pattern of previous demands, they likely will ask for a wage increase of about 21 to 24 cents an hour.

They are expected to emphasize a sizable wage increase and a larger railway contribution to a special job security fund set up in the last round of talks that ended 15 months ago.

Wage demands have been tied to the cost of durable goods standard — an average, computed by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, of wages paid in several basic Canadian industries.

The unions estimated last time that figures are available, the standard stood at almost \$2.11 an hour. By Dec. 31, the non-ops' present contract expires, the standard is expected to be about 15 cents an hour higher than the non-ops' wage.

To close the gap and maintain parity through the use of another two-year contract would take an increase of more than 20 cents an hour.

KEY ISSUE PREVIOUSLY

The expected upturn in traffic and its promise of more employment could mean that at least some of the unions will issue the emphasis put this time on job security, the key issue in the last round of talks.

The present contract established a fund into which each of the seven railways involved in the joint negotiations contribute the equivalent of one hour for each employee — a total during the life of the contract of about \$100,000.

None of the money has been spent, however, since the unions and the railways have been unable to agree on how it should be used.

A demand for an increase to the present fund could run as high as five cents an hour.

The unions estimated last time that they would need the equivalent of six cents an hour to fund and give the workers the protection they wanted. They may decide this time to seek a difference between their estimate and the present railway contribution of one cent.

The agreement on the present expiring contract came from a unanimous report of a federal conciliation board, under Mr. Justice Craig Munroe of the British Columbia Supreme Court.

The board was established after negotiations between the railways and the unions collapsed after only five meetings.

LABOR RELATIONS Meeting Opens

HALIFAX (CP)—A two-day interprovincial conference on employer-employee relations in the public service opened here Wednesday with cabinet ministers of nine Canadian provinces in attendance. Only the British Columbia government was not represented.

The conference is also being attended by provincial representatives of civil service associations and civil service commissioner. The conference, closed to the public, is the second of its kind in Canada.

Speaking on the eve of the conference Tuesday night, Cal Best, president of the Civil Service Association of Canada, said collective bargaining between employers and employees will not bring about "a land of milk and honey" and the system will not be introduced overnight.

St. John's Council Backs Move

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—City council Wednesday gave its "complete support" to an arrangement diverting some freight and St. John's by direct water route from Montreal rather than by rail through North Sydney, N.S., and Port aux Basques, Nfld.

At the council's weekly meeting, a motion was passed offering complete support and any help council can give to local landowners.

It was also decided to notify Premier Joseph Smallwood, the Canadian National Railways, the Longshoremen's Protective Union (L.P.U.) and federal government officials of the decision.

Union officials at North Sydney and Port aux Basques claim the arrangement between the freight and steamship companies for direct freight shipments has had an adverse effect on employment in their towns.

Takes Two Cakes To Hold Candles

MONUMENT DEAFED

HAMILTON, Ont. (CP)—Police were investigating Saturday the destruction of a Jewish monument unveiled last Sunday near here. The large, black stone monument was erected in memory of the 6,000 Jews who were murdered by the Germans during the Second World War. The monument was smeared with brown paint and a fire was set behind it, police said.
