Don Marshall Is Often Overlooked

One of the unsung heroes of the surprising New York Rangers is a guy by the name of Don Marshall, one of the most underrated players in the National Hockey League today.

During his first season with the Rangers, in which he scored 11 goals and twelve assists for a disappointing twenty three points, Marshall was an extremely underrated player.

But the next year, he made such a comeback that he was voted the most valuable player on the Ranger roster, and climbed with linemates Phil Goyette and Bob Nevin, made up one of the highest scoring units in the league.

Every spring when asked if he will return, the seemingly slight 5 foot 10 inch 165 pounder with the receding hairline answers in the same manner "We'll see how I feel, and how Betty feels, and if the team still wants me."

Chico Maki is the right winger on the "RED" line of the Chicago Black Hawks, and centreman Paul Esposito calls him "the best right wing in the league, as far as I'm concerned, including Gord Howe."

High now, Maki is more than a good, honest hardworking hockey player, and less than the best right wing in the league, but he's coming on, and someday Phil will be able to look back and say "I told you so."

Often when a player has had a few years in the NHL, he can be categorized. One can say that he is an average player, or a good defensive player, or a genuine superstar, as in Maki's case.

Maki's ability to put the puck in the net has never been in question. He led the Junior OHA in scoring with 92 points in the 1959-60 season, and was the award as the outstanding rookie the next season in the American League.

Esposito has much the same philosophy. "No one can compare with the hustle that Chico has. He makes me every game with his constant checking, and like Bobby, I can concentrate a lot more of offense because of it," he said.

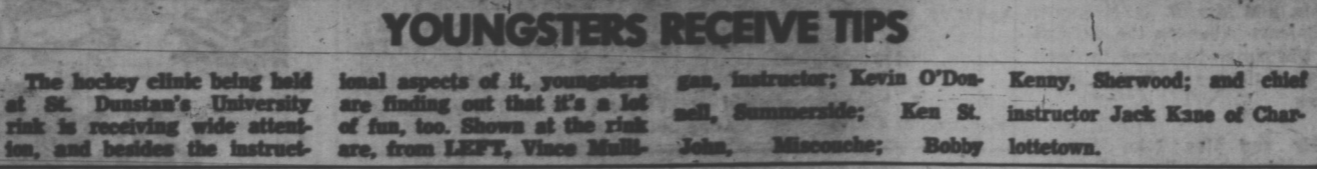
HUNTERS' CORNER

Athletes Are Suspended

URBANA, Ill. (AP) — Twelve University of Illinois football and basketball players have been suspended from athletic competition for receiving financial aid in violation of Big Ten Conference rules. Bill Reed, conference commissioner, announced Friday.

Reed's statement, issued after a conference with university officials who initiated the investigation, said 10 Illinois athletes have been paid amounts mostly ranging from \$25 to \$25 a month for varying lengths of time since 1965. In one case, the stipend was \$50 a month, he said.

Borden Legion Nationals, Pope Motor Aces Tie

SUMMERSIDE — The Borden Legion Nationals and the Summerside Pope Motors Aces played to a 6-6 tie here last night in one of the most exciting hockey games of the season at Civic Stadium.

The Nationals, led by the hat-trick of Gerard Roberts and a strong game by Summerside boy Lloyd "Toy-Toy" Gallant, home on Christmas holidays from Newfoundland where he is playing hockey this winter, came from behind in the fast, cleanly-played game and appeared to have the game won when Roberts scored his third goal at 17:58 of the final period, but the Aces stole the victory from them with Donnie Arsenault's goal with a minute and a half to go in the game.
