

Hospital Plan Provision Omitted In N.S. Budget

HALIFAX (CP) — A budget without provision for financing the province's share of the national hospital insurance plan was tabled in the Nova Scotia legislature Wednesday.

Premier Stanfield called it "the budget picture without the hospital plan." It shows an estimated 1958-59 surplus of \$84,595 after provision for sinking fund payments. This compares with the forecast surplus for the 1957-58 fiscal year of \$104,785.75.

Total revenue is estimated at \$73,635,000, an increase of about \$8,000,000 over last year. Estimated expenditure of \$67,504,000 is \$7,521,348 more than last year's forecast.

But the question of how the government plans to finance the hospital plan was left unanswered.

TWO WAYS SUGGESTED

Stanfield suggested two ways it could be done but did not commit the government to either. He said the choice is between a premium plan or "more tax revenue." He said it should "shock no one" that the program will have to be financed by raising additional revenue.

A sales tax has been suggested but the premier did not mention it in his speech.

The premier said the government allowed "for the uncertainties of the moment" in preparing the 1958-59 budget.

"We recognize the importance of this hospital plan to the people of the province. . . And we are still prepared to study any suggestions that might be made."

Mr. Stanfield added "we hope to have the matter settled before the House prorogues."

PROVINCE'S SHARE \$6,000,000
Nova Scotia's share of the federal hospital plan would amount to more than \$6,000,000 in 1959, when the program is to begin, Mr. Stanfield said the province will require about \$2,000,000 before March 31 next year, when the fiscal year ends.

Increase in federal government grants accounts for the anticipated \$8,000,000 boost in revenues. The extra money is earmarked to offset mounting costs in education, highways, aid to municipalities and public health measures. Debt charges are expected to zoom by nearly \$1,000,000.

Mr. Stanfield said educational expenditures are up \$2,200,000.

Government officials estimate education costs will rise by \$1,000,000 every year in the foreseeable future.

The government is providing \$250,000 for new grants to universities. It also has to finance a scholarship program in teacher training. And "this year we are providing about \$389,400 for increases in teachers salaries."

HIGHWAY DEBT HIGHER

The highway program, which now absorbs about \$13,000,000 annually, is labelled to receive \$1,100,000 more this year. Most of the new money is for servicing an increased highway debt. Only about \$200,000 will go for maintenance.

Cash grants to municipalities are up \$1,000,000 in the estimates. Expansion of the mental health program will increase public health expenditures about \$400,000. In addition, \$350,000 is set aside for grants to municipal hospitals for the insane.

An additional \$260,000 is designated to pay increased mothers' allowances and \$700,000 is the province's share of boosts in old age assistance and pensions to the blind and totally disabled. Net expenditures on social assistance will increase by about \$70,000.

The year 1958 marks the 200th anniversary of the Deportation of the Acadians from Prince Edward Island known under the name of Isle Saint Jean. During the coming summer, the descendants of the thirty or forty families who escaped the deportation or who returned after peace was restored, intend to commemorate this important event in their history.

In the mind of the organizers of these functions, there is also the hope that the younger generation of Acadians may be stimulated in their efforts to educate and train themselves so as to work in harmony and true fellowship in co-operation with the youth of other races for the greater success and happiness

of all our people.

A representative executive has been appointed. This committee has selected Miscouche Celebration, which will take place at the centre for the general place on August 6th. It is the intention of this general committee to have local committees selected for all the Acadian centers of the Province. These will include the parishes of Tignish, Palmer Road, Bloomfield, Wellington, Egmont Bay, Mount Carmel, Summerside, Hope River, North Rustico, Rustico, Charlottetown, St. Charles, Rollo Bay and Souris. Further particulars of these celebrations will appear in the Press in due time.
