Trade Board President Urges Special Policies

TRURO (CP) — John M. Murphy, president of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade, says, in a letter to Finance Minister Sharp, that tight money policies should be applied to parts of the country where there is threat of inflation.

The letter, in response to Mr. Sharp's request for suggestions on preparation of the federal budget, says any measure of prosperity in the Atlantic region comes in the wake of a wave of prosperity in Central Canada.

"It has invariably happened that as an ebbing wave of prosperity is about to reach our shores, a so-called 'tight-money' policy is instituted because of inflationary tendencies in other parts of Canada," he said.

This had the effect of creating a "tight 'tight-money'" situation. The Atlantic region had been under a tight money policy constantly since confederation.

Mr. Murphy said unemployment was greatest in the Atlantic area and rates of pay a third less than other areas of the country. This was reason to speed up construction and encourage more capital investment.

He said the board was deeply concerned over the government's failure to institute "massive investment" in the Atlantic region in services such as health, education, transport and development of natural resources as recommended by the economic council of Canada.

Marriage Course Date Scheduled

SUMMERSIDE — As in previous years, a course of preparation for marriage will be conducted at St. Paul's parish beginning this Sunday evening, January 23rd. It is open to all young people of Summerside and neighbouring areas who are going steady with a view to marriage.

The course bears the title "This Is A Great Sacrament" and is published by the extension department of the University of Ottawa. It consists of 18 lessons treating such topics as the Christian idea of marriage, love and happiness in marriage, courtship and engagement, relations between husband and wife, sex hygiene, the morality of sex, etc.

Appeal In Murder Case To Be Heard Thursday

SUMMERSIDE — Arthur Gordon Andrews, Freetown, charged with capital murder, had his case adjourned to Jan. 27 in County Court here yesterday before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald. On that date an appeal will be heard to transfer his trial to juvenile court.

Joseph Richard Smith, Saint John, charged with damage to property of less than \$50, pleaded guilty and was fined \$150 plus costs or three months in jail. The charge arose from an incident at the Garden of the Gulf Motel when the accused smashed a plate glass door. Defence counsel was Bernard McCabe.

Cecilia (Mrs. Peter Frank) Labobe, Lennox Island, changed her plea to guilty of obstructing or averting the course of justice. Sentence was deferred to June 2. The accused was represented by J. Melville Campbell.

The funeral was held yesterday from the MacLean Funeral Home. Interment took place in the Peoples cemetery.
