

### Suspended Sentence Given Former Summerside Man

SUMMERSIDE — A former resident of Summerside was given a suspended sentence when he appeared in Police Court here yesterday charged with theft.

The accused, who was arrested by Summerside police Sunday while carrying a shot gun and a half-plucked chicken, pleaded guilty to the charge but stated that he had taken the coat by mistake believing it to be the property of a relative.

The 57-year-old man now a resident of Aulac, N.B., said he was in Summerside looking for the home of his cousin. He wandered into several homes on Belmont Street and took the coat from the apartment of Donald Harris. He said he had no knowledge of a signet ring also reported missing.

Asked by presiding Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C., if he would stay away from the island if released, the man said he would "with the greatest of pleasure." He, however, expressed a desire to return for Old Home Week.

A Summerside man appearing on the docket for sentencing after being convicted last week on a charge of common assault,

Police Chief Peter White asked for an adjournment on another case because another charge is pending against the accused.

## Fire Guts Storage Depot, Burns Service Station

Fire gutted a Canadian Oil Company storage depot and pumping station and heavily damaged a White Rose Service Station at Elmsdale yesterday afternoon.

Originating as a grass fire, the flames had made considerable headway by the time the Alberton Fire Department arrived on the scene, but firemen were able to bring the blaze under control before it destroyed the service station.

While firemen were fighting the blaze, neighbours assisted Robert and Ross MacWilliams, owners of the service station in removing all stock and equipment.

An expanding gas valve cracked under pressure and sent a 1-1/2-inch piece of metal sailing through the front window of a house owned by Leonard Barnett, about 100 yards from the scene of the blaze. No one was injured, but the metal smashed a vase located atop the television set which was situated in front of the window.

Flames scorched the paint from the side of a 10,000-gallon gasoline storage tank only a few feet away from the blazing oil building.

Damage to the storage depot, which is also a farm dealership outlet, owned by Everet Williams, was extensive. In addition to the 15 x 15 building losses included a large stock of oils, greases and other products, all pumping equipment, expensive valves and other equipment used in the handling of farm oil and gas.

## Mill River Girl Award Winner

Norma Horne of Mill River has received from the Carnegie Hero Fund a bronze medal and a monetary award for having saved the life of a young Summerside boy who was in danger of drowning.

On a Sunday afternoon in June, 1957, a number of people had sought relief from the heat by going to the shore of Mill River at Long Creek Bridge, not far from Norma's home.

Among them was seven-year-old Ivan Richard, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Richard of Summerside, who was out in the water on an inflated rubber tube. He was beyond his depth when he lost his grasp and the tube floated away. In response to his frightened cries for help his mother, also a non-swimmer, attempted to go to his rescue, but was unable to reach him. At this point Norma ran into the water, swam out, and brought him safely to shore.

PASSED TESTS

Two years before Norma had passed the junior tests in a Red Cross swimming and water safety course under instruction of Miss Martha Meyer of Bloomfield. Since junior lessons do not include life-saving, Norma gained that knowledge she had of life saving from observation of more advanced classes. Only 15 years of age at the time, she displayed presence of mind, courage and skill in the emergency.

At the time she received commendation from those who witnessed her prompt action, from Mrs. Harry Cudmore, provincial director of Red Cross swimming and water safety.

Information concerning the rescue was sent to the Carnegie Hero fund in Pittsburgh, Penn. Correspondence ensued, and last fall a representative of the hero fund visited Norma at her home. Recently the above mentioned awards have been sent to her. The bronze medal, three inches in diameter, bears a bust of Carnegie and the words — "Carnegie Hero Fund, established April 15, 1904." on the back of the medal is the inscription: "Norma Belle Horne who saved J. Ivan Richard from drowning; Alberton, P. E. I. June 16, 1957." Surrounding the inscription is the scriptural quotation, "Greater Love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends."

ELDEST DAUGHTER

Norma, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Horne, will be 17 years of age in May. She received the first part of her education in the rural school at Mill River East. Last year she took grade II in O'Leary and is at present studying Grade 12 in Alberton.

She is a good student and expresses an interest in the teaching profession. She has a pleasing personality and is modest to the point of reticence concerning the life-saving episode and the honor which has come to her.

An interesting sidelight to this story is that more than 50 years ago a similar award from the Carnegie Hero Fund was presented to another resident of this area, Mrs. James O'Brien of Elmsdale.

The former, Mary Ann MacKinnon of Grand River was teaching school in Campbellton when she saved Florence McKendrick from drowning in Wright's Pond. Florence McKendrick, now Mrs. W. C. McLeod of Charlottetown, is a sister of Norma Horne's maternal grandfather, Mr. William McKendrick of Campbellton.
