More Butler To Be Imported

OTTAWA, Nov. 6.— Agriculture Minister Gardiner gave notice today that he will seek parliamentary approval of administrative machinery for Government purchase and sale of butter.

The work of buying butter to counter a possible shortage next winter is being carried out by the Agriculture Products Board.

Mr. Gardiner gave notice of a motion on the Commons order paper to finance the board through a revolving fund to be maintained at a minimum amount of \$15,000,000.

The Government has been purchasing butter from New Zealand and European countries during the summer months and will sell this to the trade during the off-season winter months.

Strange But True

In November, 1819, when the Essex was in the Pacific, three boats were torn to shreds by an angry whale. The mother ship, Essex, foundered some hours later and the crew had to row a trow and miles to the nearest land. Their subsequent adventures were so terrible that they resorted to cannibalism. Only a handful of them survived to be rescued from one of the most blood curdling tales of the sea.

The Duke of Windsor did two things that astonished the world, namely: He abdicated the throne and renounced his title to the best dressed male in the world.

The newly coined word, blimp, is a war baby, born during the last World War, when Britain classified her non-rigid airships as the B-limp type. Eventually, the hyphen was left out.

When coffee was first used as a beverage only the upper crust drank it. Now it is used by millions all over the world.

Throughout the Middle Ages it was believed that there existed in man a bone imponderable, incorruptible, incombustible, the necessary nucleus of the resurrected body. 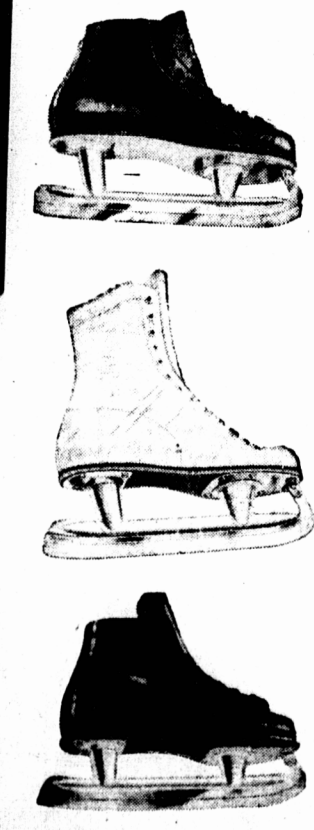
FINE CATCH
