TORONTO (CP) — Fifteen members of the Duke of Edinburgh's Second Commonwealth Study Conference will spend a week in Newfoundland in May, visiting communities to learn about the impact of industrialization on the people. It was announced here.

J. Johnstone, Woods manager for Anglo-Newfoundland Development Company and chairman of a committee in charge of arrangements for the group's visit, said the members will arrive in St. John's by air May 17.

They will spend two days in the capital before moving to Grand Falls, Windsor, Buchan and other communities in north-central Newfoundland.

The group will use logging operations and the pulp and paper mills at Grand Falls and mining operations at Buchan. They may also visit the Port of Bonaville.

Mr. Johnstone for the Newfoundland visit are Col. W. F. Tucker, mayor of Grand Falls, A. Peddie, mayor of Windsor, Donaid Murphy, International Association of Machinists, London, 1906, and R. R. Martin, general manager of American Smelting and Refining Limited.

W. Thomas Howell, superintendent of community relations and publicity for Anglo-Newfoundland Development, is liaison officer for the committee.

Mr. Johnstone said the purpose of the conference "is to make it possible for the group to see for themselves the human consequences of industrialization in a wide variety of settings throughout Canada."

Some 300 men and women from more than 30 Commonwealth countries will attend the conference.

Accordingly, he starts by a low spade to the three, after winning the opening lead. He does not first lead the spades in the fabled hope of catching the singleton king because that would allow a vital entry to dummy if the king did not fall.

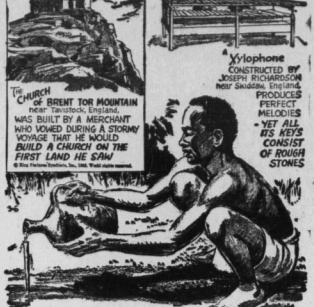
East takes the king and returns a club which is ruffed. Declarer then crosses to the nine of spades and leads a low ace in careful not to lead the nine because that card is important to keep in dummy for later use.

When East follows to Jack, West wins with the queen and returns a club which South ruffs. Declarer enters dummy with the jack of spades and now leads it nine of hearts if East ducks, it is nine of hearts. When the finesse wins, declarer repeats it and makes the contract.

It is interesting to note that if the first heart lead from dummy is the nine, South goes down.
