

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Harness horse papers that have arrived this week devoted pages to the Hambletonian Stake, richest purse ever raced for, the three-year-old trotters competing for \$117,117.98. In addition to it the Goshen track had other stakes that drew the best two and three-year-old trotters and pacers in the world to race for. It was in the Geers Two Year Old Pace, purse \$18,977 that Joe O'Brien received the injuries which hospitalized him and curtailed his activities since. Because of the large number of entries it had to be run off in two sections. The first was won by Dell Miller with Dale Frost, a black colt by Hal Dale, Red Flame by The Widower was second. The time was 2:01 1/5, the fastest time ever recorded for this 19-year-old event. The second section was won by Joe O'Brien with Meadow Pace a bay colt by Adios in 2:03 1/5. In the final Meadow Pace went down near the quarter pole with Joe O'Brien. The time in the final mile was 2:01 3/5 and it was won by Dale Frost with Red Flame second. Dale Frost's two miles equalled the world's record for two consecutive miles by a two-year-old pacer.

In the Ohio breeders Three Year Old Pace for Ladies Countess Vivian by King's Counsel, driven by Del Miller, was 1-1, time 2:00 2/5, the world's record for three-year-old pacing fillies for one heat and a two heat race. The victory of Helicopter by Hoot Mon in the Hambletonian Stake must have been a most pleasant surprise to the owners, J. Elgin Armstrong and C. Edwin Armstrong of Brampton, Ont. The colt had been sold at the 1935 Harrisburg sale for \$1150 to Del Miller and Del was training him and later sold him to the two Canadians. He continued training him but allowed his assistant trainer, 29-year-old Harry Harvey, to drive him in the big show and Harry won and the owners received \$53,126.59 as their share of the purse. Two other horses, Morse Hanover that finished second and Elby Hanover that finished fourth in the same event were purchased at the same sale for \$3400 and \$1800 respectively and they won \$27,699 and \$35,490. Of course they got into the hands of good trainers and their owners had both plenty of nerve to pay the big fees to stake them.

And now we have our first letter from Claude O'Brien and he says our readers will be delighted to say Hello. "Just a few lines to say Hello, and give you some horse news from Vernon Downs. I spent a couple of evenings watching the races with your friend Walter Found of Merced, California. He is certainly a nice man and has as good a horse at I ever saw in Patrick Primrose—black as a crow, kind as a kitten and round and plump. He won last night and paced 2:02 1/5. His sire is Peter Primrose 2:01 1/5 by Peter Volo 2:02 and looks as though he will be quite a success. I have seen several of his get that look like real ones. I headed a field of aged horses with one—Mack Primrose—a two-year-old that Mr. Camp bought last spring in California. Joe started him but he had a bad mouth which made it difficult to rein him. Now he is improving all the time. He paced his mile in 2:06 1/5 and has a heart like a lion. I start him again on Monday night (the 24th) in a \$5000 stake for two-year-olds. I hope I can lower his record a little more.

"Joe is busy racing on the Grand Circuit and I have 13 two and three-year-olds here at Vernon, also one aged horse named Dazzle Way. He is by Billy Direct 1:55 out of Erla, the dam of Dick Erla. I have worked him in 2:10. Joe intends to give him a record at Lexington. He is a five-year-old and can actually fly but the problem is to keep him sound. So far he is okay this year. Mr. Camp has a few colts by him. The first one is called Dazzle Mac. He started once—about a week ago—and paced in 2:03. I have been racing a big three-year-old by Scotland called Bothwell. He has only started three times in his life. I won the last two races with him, his best

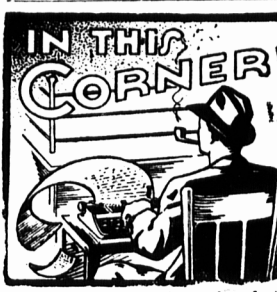
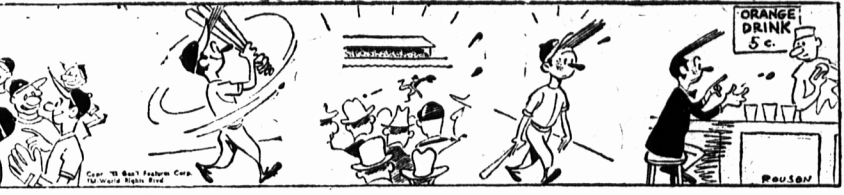

I was not at Roosevelt one night and drove Prince Jay. Had a very close finish with Direct Rhythm in 2:01 1/5. I could have won but Thomas B. Scott had me covered up and I didn't get out in time, but it took a photo to decide the winner.

"You would like this three-quarter mile track I am sure, although I do not think the footing is much faster than Charlottetown. It was built in a hurry but another year it will be better. I saw Hi-Lo Forbes pace in 1:38 here and I have spent a lot of time with Henry Culker. He is a nice fellow. Hi-Lo Forbes is a little black horse, common looking and going slow he doesn't look much, reminds me of Whispering Hope. He has him now with full swedge all round—rather different from most pacers. I spent some time with Earl Avery at Roosevelt and he asked about you. The Hambletonian was an awful scramble—too many horses. Morse Hanover won the first heat and got out down the second or might have won it. Will say so long for now. Please give my regards to all friends at home."

"No Ring Ethics" Claims Gorgeous George After Losing In Wild Match

Amid a crescendo of flying bodies, angry officials and blood-covered wrestlers the Elephant Boy last night emerged from a colorful and action packed wrestling match at the Forum a winner over the Hollywood Honey, Gorgeous George.

The infuriated George, his face a mass of blood from a cut on his forehead, pummeled the Elephant Boy from post to post, after being disqualified on the third fall for striking referee Joe Risk.

And as the referee attempted to halt George the latter turned on the official. Into the ring came the wrestling promoters, the female wrestler, The Black Devil, and Gorgeous George's valet, Little Jefferies. And out through the ropes went one of the promoters the lady wrestler and the valet.

For minutes the wrestlers slugged it out with one another, the referee and the officials. Finally the referee and the promoters got the Elephant Boy out of the ring and shortly afterwards a doctor was called in to attend Gorgeous George.

In his dressing room afterwards Gorgeous George was in an angry mood. "He (the Elephant Boy) has absolutely no ring ethics," he shouted. "I'll wrestle him again and this time everything will go with no holds barred. Besides the winner will take the whole purse."

There was bad blood brewing between the two wrestlers last night before both were in the ring. Little Jefferies, George's faithful valet had just completed spraying the ropes with perfume when the Elephant Boy attacked him from behind.

George was on his way from the dressing room to the ring when the
