Class 15 and 16—Fish, Leather and Harness, Wm. Gordon.

Class 17—Miscellaneous, G. W. Hibbitt.

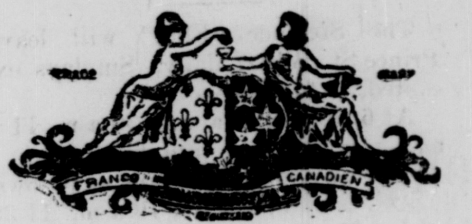
