In speaking of the world struggle for control of metals he stated there had been numerous changes in the supply system and it was necessary for various metals to be found and developed on this continent. The demand for metals has caused higher prices and thus stimulated the greater use of investment capital.

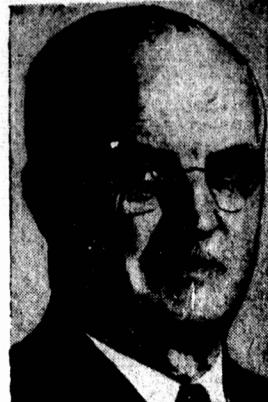
