24 Cases Heard Yesterday In Alberton Court

There were twenty-four cases on the docket at the Alberton Court House yesterday with Magistrate R. S. Hinton, presiding. A fisherman from Alberton South pleaded guilty to illegal possession of a quantity of undersized lobsters contrary to the fishery regulations and was fined \$35.00 and costs. Six residents of the West Prince area and one of Miscouche were fined \$5.00 and costs each under the Highway Traffic Act for operating a motor vehicle without having a driver's license. Eight additional residents of the area received fines of \$5.00 and costs for operating a motor vehicle not equipped with lamps or other equipment in proper working order. A party from O'Leary was fined \$5.00 and costs for operating a vehicle not registered for the current year.

A man from Casseumper was fined \$10.00 and costs for driving a vehicle without due care and attention (speeding). A plea of not guilty was entered by a resident of Roseville on two charges of assault under the Criminal Code and the case was adjourned until August 2nd for trial at Alberton.

For unlawful possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor (moonshine and home made beer) a party from Coleman was fined \$25.00 and costs or one month in jail.

A man from Tignish pleaded guilty to possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor and was fined \$20.00 and costs. A resident of St. Louis was fined \$20.00 and costs for possession of liquor in a place other than a residence in which he resided.

A Tignish resident pleaded guilty to a charge of failing to drive a motor vehicle on the right side of the road where practicable and was fined \$2.00 and costs. Charged With Escaping From Queen's Co. Jail

At the continuation of the preliminary hearing of Harry Wendell McFee, charged with break, entry and theft, before Magistrate K.M. Martin yesterday morning, the additional charge of escaping from Queen's County Jail was laid by the Crown. The accused had on June 15 been sentenced to thirty days in jail and is charged with being unlawfully at large before the expiration of such sentence. The charge of theft arose from the break and entry into the store of T.L. Smith on July 1st. The accused was remanded until Monday on both counts. J.P. Nicholson appeared for the Crown and R.R. Bell, Q.C. is representing the accused.

Previously remanded, two youths charged with attempted break and entry with intent to commit theft, were both convicted and remanded one week for sentence. The case arose from the attempt by the two to break into the victim's store on Upper Hillboro Street, July 5. Four witnesses were heard for the Crown. Mrs. May Vickerson, proprietress, Mrs. Marion MacDonald who resides next to the store, Sgt. Lloyd Archer and Sgt. Neil MacNevin of the City Police, who told of answering a call to the scene and of the arrest of the two accused. The accused were represented by J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C. and J.P. Nicholson appeared for the Crown.

A taxi operator charged with operating a motor vehicle without due care and exceeding 30 m.p.h., was fined fifty dollars and costs or twenty days. A drunk and disorderly arrested on complaint of his wife was remanded until this morning as were two charged with drunk and incapable three were fined five dollars and costs or two days and the fourth ten dollars and costs or five days.

Predicts Heavy Increase In Newspaper Advertising

TORONTO (CP)—The prospect is clear that advertising in Canadian newspapers is moving to new highs, according to Einar V. Rehnitz, president of the Canadian Association of Advertising Agencies and of MacLaren Advertising Co. Ltd. "Newspapers are still the number one medium, as they always have been," he declared. The view was quoted in Canadian Markets, official paper of the Canadian Daily Newspaper Publishers Association, which carried his comments on a forecast of a 65-per-cent increase in newspaper advertising volume by 1965, made by Karl T. Finn, president of the Newspaper Advertising Executives Association. Mr. Finn, advertising director of the Cincinnati Times-Star, said the increase would reflect the "greatest resurgence of newspaper advertising in all history." He spoke at the association's annual meeting at Victoria. The prospect of continued gains for dailies is as clear or clearer in Canada as it is in the United States," Mr. Rehnitz said.

Only 153 Donors At Montague Red Cross Clinic

The last of this week's Red Cross blood donor clinics held yesterday afternoon and evening at the Beaver Club Hall in Montague produced 153 donors on an objective of 250. Of this number 71 were from Montague itself and the remainder from many of the surrounding districts. The clinic staff was ably assisted by the Montague Women's Institute who again provided refreshments and workers. Mrs. Walter Beer headed the volunteer nurses and several High School Red Cross members were valued helpers. The total number of donors registered for the four days of clinics was 684 on an objective of 950. It is hoped that the attendance at the next series to be held the last week in August at Summerside, Souris, St. Peter's Bay and Morell will be more fruitful.
