

Signals Regiment Returns After Nine Days In Camp

Ten officers of 5 Signals Regiment completed successfully a course in tactics, while one completed a Captain to Major and another Lieutenant to Captain qualification courses during the nine days the Regiment spent in summer training at Camp Farnham P. Q.

The Regiment, commanded by Lt.-Col. F. S. Jenkins, E. D., returned home by train last evening. While at Camp Farnham, it was attached to 3 Signal Squadron of the Active Force commanded by Major E. E. Doide, C. D.

In this training period seven candidates completed senior N. C. O. courses, two completed junior N. C. O. courses; 14 were integrated with the Active Force on wireless net; eleven took various phases in "in-job" training; and 38 took wireless and line courses.

In addition 12 members of the Regiment were attached to Ordnance to supply line and wireless communication to the RCOC Militia Camp.

Visitors to the training camp included: Major-General M. P. Bogert, Major-General Rockingham, Colonel A. W. Rogers, Lt.-Col. J. T. Davies, and Major O. R. Simons.

Lt. Colonel K. M. Johnston and Lt.-Col. F. J. Storey were attached to the Regiment as observers.

Lt.-Col. Jenkins said last night that this was one of the most successful camps held since World War Two.

"The results were very gratifying and the co-operation between Active Force and Militia Units was excellent," he added.

Says 36-Cents Bushel Price Offered On Potatoes

L.W. Pearsall, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization Board said Friday that the Cabinet had approved establishment of a 36-cent a bushel support price for surplus Island potatoes.

The Ottawa official released this information in a phone conversation with Mr. Elric Campbell, former manager of the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board, and a member of the first Island delegation that approached Ottawa this spring on the matter of assistance for the potato industry.

In the memorandum handed the last Island delegation which returned to the Province about two weeks ago, no mention of this price was made, Mr. Campbell stated.

This delegation comprised Mr. William MacLennan, Albany, chairman of the P.E.I. Marketing Board; Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture and Mr. R.L. Burge, Five Houses, prominent Kings County grower and shopper.

Many interested persons feel that this offer is at least nine cents too low, Mr. Campbell asserted.

In order to match the starch assistance program now in effect in New Brunswick, we should get a minimum of 45 cents a bushel," the former Provincial marketing official noted.

"Including the amounts paid by the starch plants, the price to the grower in New Brunswick works out to \$1.45 for 165 pounds," he added.

Mr. Campbell stated that a meeting of all interested groups would probably be called early this week to consider and decide what further action will be taken.

Admits He Planned To Kidnap Wife Of Singer Bing Crosby

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A man held on a robbery charge has admitted that he and an accomplice planned to kidnap the wife of singer Bing Crosby. They also considered abducting Lt. - Gen. Rafael Trujillo Jr., son of the Dominican Republic strongman.

Wilburn E. Davison, 48, told police and reporters Saturday that he and his partner planned to abduct actress Kathy Grant Crosby either here or in Palm Springs and hold her for \$100,000 ransom.

Davison, arrested two weeks ago on the robbery charge, told a reporter he conceived the kidnap plot about three months ago.

"I figured Crosby would pay off and wouldn't even miss the money," Davison said. "I mentioned it to Kling (Gene Thorne Kling, 40), and he agreed to it. 'Actually, this kidnap thing never did get past the beer-talk stage . . . about a month ago I read in a magazine—I think it was a movie fan magazine—about Mrs. Crosby being pregnant."

"Then I said 'no dice.' I didn't want to get mixed up in anything like that."

"In all her excitement she might have started having her baby while we had her. And I didn't want any part of that."

Mrs. Crosby, in Reno, Nev., to judge a beauty contest, termed the kidnap plan ridiculous.

She said she hoped it didn't disturb Bing, who is on a fishing trip in the Canadian northwest.

Davison was arrested here in connection with a \$25,000 supermarket robbery. Kling got away and is still at large.

Yanks Suspect Propaganda Hooks In Nuclear Conference

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States has accused Russia of concealing some propaganda hooks in its note accepting scientific talks on nuclear test detection. It said the points must be cleared away before the talks open in Geneva July 1.

Although this threatened a possible delay, press officer Joseph Reap said at the state department Saturday that he assumed the conference would begin on schedule.

Russia's latest move came Friday when Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko handed U.S. Ambassador Llewellyn Thompson a note agreeing to start the meeting at Geneva July 1 as President Eisenhower had suggested last Tuesday.

The state department said, however, that the Gromyko note "has inaccurately stated other points already agreed upon with respect to the convening of the talks."

These were the things to which the state department objected:

1. Eisenhower's last letter said the U.S. side would consist of the United States, Britain, France, and possibly other countries. But the latest Gromyko note said the U.S. side would consist of the three Western powers and the Soviet side would consist of Russia, Poland, and Czechoslovakia.
2. On another point related to representatives at the talks, the Soviet note expressed regret that it had not been possible to reach agreement on including India and possibly other neutral powers in the Geneva talks. Gromyko dealt with the Indian question as one on which the U.S. had slammed the door.
