FIVE-POINT GOAL SET BY KINSMEN

Kinship has a five-fold objective in order to promote and direct fellowship among young men of good character in Canada. These five points are:

1. That they may be improved and educated in modern business and professional methods and ethics.
2. That the interest of each in the welfare of his community may be stimulated.
3. That constitutional authority may be upheld.
4. That a spirit of co-operation, tolerance, understanding and equality between all nations and all peoples be fostered and stimulated and that unity of thought and purpose throughout Canada be established towards this goal.
5. That they shall carry on service work within their community.

Scores Of Kids Enjoy Kin Fete On Hallowe'en

Hobgoblins glare, weird figures and figurines glide in moonlight, masks glow or glower, and the modern world fades into fantasy for hundreds of kids, guests at the Armouries of the Charlottetown Kinsmen Club.

Designed primarily to help make for a quieter Hallowe'en and a more peaceful, less damaged city, the annual Kinsmen party has rapidly become one of the outstanding events of the year for children here.

The huge Armouries loses its spaciousness under the crowding impact of the hundreds of youthful bodies which jam the vast floor surface of the parade square. They are there for a good time and the Kinsmen certainly see that they get it.

Movies and treats, stage entertainment and prizes, all make the night a memorable one for the kids of all ages who attend.

The result is far less mischievousness than in former years, far less wanton damage to property and a general orderliness that prevails even beyond the confines of the Armouries as the lesson learned there is carried into teenage Hallowe'en activities in later years.

It is just another of the Kinsmen Club projects for community betterment with the club bearing all the expenses.

Proud Record Is Set As Club Comes Of Age

This is "coming-of-age year" for the Charlottetown Kinsmen Club, since it was late in 1937, almost 21 years ago that a group of young businessmen launched the organization with community betterment as its primary purpose. On Charter Night, 19 members swung into activity. Four of that original group remain active.

As it moves into maturity, in terms of years, the club continues to have community service as its goal, with the Kinsmen Carnival, to be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings of this week, as a key feature in its program.

It also looks back on a record of notable achievements.

MANY PROJECTS

Aside from its more publicized works during the past years the club has spent much time and money on providing playground equipment for the four city squares; installation of sound equipment in the public schools, promotion of juvenile and junior baseball and hockey teams; and a donation of a television set to the Sanatorium.

Also on the list is the establishment of an arts and crafts cen-

tre; blood donor clinic promotion; initiation of the dental clinic; welfare baskets for the poor; donation of school prizes and Musical festival scholarships.

The greatest honor any local club can have came in 1952 when the Charlottetown Club supplied the officers for the national Association of Kinsmen Clubs.

At that time A. Walther Gaddt was national president; Ivo Sinclair, treasurer; Stewart Ives, secretary; A. Fremont Archer, registrar; Ian Rankin, co-ordinator.

TROPHIES WON

With the passage of time many national and district trophies have come to the local club. They have won the Boake Efficiency Trophy twice, the Gemmill Bowling Trophy five times and the Ritchie Bulletin Trophy.

One of the proudest moments was on Founder's Night in 1951 when Hal Rogers, founder of Kinsmen Clubs, visited the Charlottetown Kinsmen and received the key to the city from the Mayor J.D. Stewart.

Prior to that the local group had been responsible for the extension of Kinsmanship to Summerside through the formation of the Summerside Kinsmen Club.

Concept Of Hell Is Necessary

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—With more preaching about hell, evangelist Billy Graham declares, there might be less hell in the community.

Hell is an unpopular subject "but that doesn't mean we should ignore it," Graham told a Cow Palace audience of 16,200 Sunday.

He described hell as a place where the punishment of a just God is meted out to the wicked, not a sadist's torture chamber.

Graham said he believed in hell because the concept is necessary to restrain sin among men and to separate the wicked from the good.

LENGTHY TEST

Since its inception the Charlottetown Kinsmen Club has had a long succession of presidents, several of whom have since passed from the local scene. Some are still active in the local club while others are now connected with Kinsmen elsewhere.

Treasurer Faces Bribery Charges

HOBART, Australia (Reuters) Roy Fagan, Tasmanian attorney-general, announced tonight that government Treasurer Dr. Reginald Turnbull will be prosecuted "on matters relating to bribery allegations."

George Fitzpatrick of Sydney recently alleged that Turnbull had sought a bribe from him in consideration of a licence now held by Tasmanian lotteries.

Turnbull denied the allegation and counter-charged that Fitzpatrick offered him a bribe. Fitzpatrick denies this.

Boy Cut In Two By Plane Prop

VICTORIA (CP) — Two boys accidentally started the engine of a moored float-equipped plane Monday night. One was cut in two by the whirling propeller and his companion spent a nightmarish 10 minutes in the water dodging the lurching aircraft.

Navy divers prepared to search today for part of the body of John Morrison, 15.

Robert Turnbull, 16, who was

chased to shore by the plane and found huddled in the underbrush almost numb with shock, later told investigators what happened.

The boys rowed a small boat out to the single-engine Aerocraft Sedan tied to a mooring buoy on nearby Elk Lake.

CLIMBED IN — They climbed into the cabin of the unoccupied plane and began playing with switches and levers. The engine roared into life and the plane lurched forward.

Morrison climbed from the cabin first, apparently trying to get back into the boat. He either walked or fell into the propeller. The lower part of his body fell into the boat.

Turnbull said he followed, fell into the water and looked back to see the plane turn and roar towards him.

The boy twice swam in different directions but each time, he said, the uncontrolled plane came ashore. When he reached shore he threw himself into the water, brush and the plane slammed into an alder tree.

Police found the plane with its engines running at full throttle.

Blind Woman Has Many Interests

VANCOUVER (CP) — Being blind and deaf doesn't stop Mrs. Marjorie McGuffin from running an efficient home and helping others.

The spunky little 55-year-old grandmother is a national consultant for the Canadian National Institute for the Blind. Her qualifications for this task have been earned since she was 4 when she decided to train herself to overcome the handicaps.

From the age of 20, when she became blind, until she was 4, she had not been able to read. Her three children were growing up, and she was not over-actively around the house.

SUCCESSFUL WRITER

She decided to learn Braille in order to read the Bible. Now she is a successful free-lance writer, president and founder of the Deaf-Blind League of Canada and editor of a Braille magazine she started herself—Dots and Taps.

Mrs. McGuffin had been tall, dally deaf since she was seven. Married at 18, she has always done her household tasks.

Her doorbell is a vibrator under the floor. She has an automatic washer, an electric stove with timers in Braille, and a wall clock with a vibrator to tell the time.

Since the children left the house, there is no telephone or radio. Her husband, Albert, deaf.

At 14 she had to quit school because of fading eyesight. She had a habit of roaming the North Vancouver woods as a youngster and once was nearly drowned when a log she was riding began floating out to sea.

Donations and money Mrs. McGuffin has earned with her various articles have purchased Braille machines for Canadian who are both deaf and blind.
