EDITORIAL WALKING TOUR. The editor of the St. John Sun prefers the natural and primitive method of recreation, by which he obtains recreation, and an opportunity to see the country. He writes interesting letters as he walks. We quote a couple of paragraphs: "There is nothing like walking. Realizing these things, we soon put away the trival and unworthy temptation to use a bicycle on our Prince Edward Island tour, which began at Summerside on Friday, the 10th inst. So we went to the station and took the train for Charlottetown. The passenger by the Northumberland has a good ship to goon. Those who say that the Northumberland is too luxurious and elegant for the service have not the sympathy of the tourist, who, of course, thinks nothing too good for him. But the most exacting wayfarer—even the walking tourist—must admit that in size, comfort, appearance, and staidness, the Northumberland is equal to his deers. The railway accommodation for people along the line appears to be good. The scheduled stations are not far apart, and the stopping places are still more frequent. As the Island has length without great breadth, no one lives at a great distance from the railway, which reaches from end to end, and no one near the line is far from the station. The railway itself is operated with the view of giving all the facilities possible, though for geographical reasons this is done largely at the expense of the owners of the road—namely, the people of Canada. But there are a few months in the autumn, after the crop is housed, when the freight traffic is very heavy. Then the farmers are obliged to freeze their crops to market before the straits are frozen up. These potatoes, oats and other farm products are delivered at stations in enormous quantities. Then the country observer can gain for himself a hint of the great productiveness of the soil and of the effectiveness of the farming. As of old, oats is yet the prevailing crop. But with the few years' experience of hams and butter and cheese and other ultimate products of the soil are becoming more and more staple articles of sale. The fact that the shipment of goods in winter is uncertain and expensive is a strong inducement for the people to reduce their crop to a condition in which the cost of transport shall be the least possible in proportion to the value. The direct produce of an acre of potatoes which might be worth say forty dollars, could not be got across the straits by an expensive means of transport. But when the produce of an acre is changed into eighty dollars worth of pork or dairy stuff, it can be shipped even by a dear method of transport."

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. MONTREAL, August 15.—The Evening Herald publishes an article exposing a divorce granting bureau, of which Rabbi Eliezer Hakohen Draker is the chief. A reporter of the paper, for the sum of \$20, secured a divorce from an alleged wife who went through the necessary form with him. The rabbi is well known in the city but is not connected with any synagogue. If the divorced people had any intention of marrying at any future time, he intimated that he would like the job. Other rabbis in the city are known to have been aware of the doings of the divorce bureau and have been known to furnish him with clients. The exposure has created a big sensation in Jewish circles. LOSBOS, August 15.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Central News says Yokohama reports of an engagement between the Chinese and Japanese fleets on August 11, and that the Japanese were victorious are denied officially. The Japanese fleet is still cruising at the mouth of the Gulf of Pechili. The Chinese fleet has been sighted. OTTAWA, Aug. 15.—Captain Spain has reported to Sir Hubert Tupper on charges of G. O. Malton and Grover, St. Andrew's, against Captain Pratt, of the S. S. Curlew, of obtaining commissions on ship's stores purchased in St. John. The report finds the charges false and malicious. COWES, Aug. 16.—It is whispered about that Emperor William is to have an incognito night of in London during his English visit, in fulfillment of a long cherished desire to see something of the great Babylon as ordinary mortals see it, and on the strength of this rumor, extra reports have been scouting around him at Cowes and will throw a coronal of observation about Aldershot this week. TORONTO, Aug. 15.—Oliver Grossi, an Italian vegetable pedlar, yesterday jacked up his house and with his wife went for a drive, leaving valuables to the extent of \$6,000, consisting of several hundred dollars in cash, together with some mortgages and notes and jewelry in a trunk in his bedroom. When he returned he discovered that the house had been entered during his absence. A search that contained \$15 had been rifled, and the trunk, but that was all the thief had secured, he having been in too great a hurry to make a thorough examination of the contents of the trunk. WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—The first official news received here concerning the operations of the Japanese fleet at Wei-Hai-Wei came to hand late this afternoon in a telegram received at a Japanese legation. The message was very brief, but it stated the effect that on the seventeenth instant nineteen Japanese men-of-war left Korean waters for Wei-Hai-Wei, which they approached at midnight on the 16th. A torpedo flotilla was immediately sent out, and on the following morning shots were exchanged with the Chinese fleet. As the Japanese men-of-war did not find any Chinese fleet they returned to Korean waters. TROMSOE, Norway, Aug. 15.—Walter Wellman and party have arrived from the Arctic region, where their steamer, Egeberg, had just been recently crushed in the ice, compelling them to abandon their attempt to reach the north pole. Col. Ingersoll once called upon the Rev. Phillips Brooks, and the great preacher received him in one of his usual and decided to see many distinguished preachers. "Why have you shown me this marked distinction?" inquired the colonel. "The reason is simple," replied Brooks, "if those preachers had I'm sure to meet them again in heaven; whereas, had you gone away and died, I should never have met you again. I thought I had better take no chances."

NEWS NOTES. Lord Wolsey's promotion to the rank of field marshal will not interfere with his command in India, which he will continue to hold until October, 1895. There is one thing it does for him, if nothing else; it prevents his falling a victim to the age disqualification. As a field marshal, nothing can touch him for his name must appear at the head of the list of general officers as long as he lives. The "Healthy and Aristic Dress Union" of London is one of the greatest enterprises of recent civilization. At one of its meetings the other evening the chairman was attired in a new-fashioned evening suit of brown velvet, faced with brown silk and worn with knee breeches and silk stockings. Instead of the starched shirt of ordinary wear, he had a silk one with large turn-down collar and a broad white silk tie. Another gentleman was in similar costume, but it was green instead of brown. France is generally thought exceptionally free in marriage relations; but in France a man cannot marry his deceased wife's sister without the special permission of the President of the Republic, which can only be given "for serious reasons." It has just been decided that it is the same with divorce as with death, and a marriage entered into by a man and his brother's wife has been annulled because the President's consent had not been obtained. The French President in his own person is evidently a sort of civil Pope so far as marriage goes. POULTRY NOTES. Chickens need gravel or broken crockery and shell quite as much as do the old fowls. If crockery or bone is at hand they will eat all that is necessary, otherwise, a week or oftener, sprinkle a little flour or bone in the mash. Consistent and persistent care of growing chickens at this season is the sure road to success. Of soft feed give only what they will eat up clean, as it often quickly. Three times a day is often enough, and the supply of water must be constant. The flock looks better if the cockerels are kept by themselves, and these last are sure to do better, as their feed can be regulated to insure more rapid growth. A Man's Personality.
