WARS AWFUL COST.

From the beginning of the late Boer war till the signing of peace 448,435 men served the Empire in South Africa says the London Express. Of these 5,774 were killed in action 16,108 died of wounds and disease and 28,929 were wounded. This is the complete record of the South African war as shown by a return issued from the War Office, signed by the Adjutant General Sir T. Kelly-Kenny.

In addition to these figures the return also shows how the great army was collected and in part indicates its dispersal, the whole silently testifying to the magnificent transport arrangements which have earned the admiration of the world.

Detail in detail with the totals shown above we find they yield some interesting reflections. Here are the figures as they appear in the mass.

KILLED IN ACTION.

DIED OF WOUNDS OR DISEASE.

Officers..... 554

Grand total of deaths, 21,942

Thus it will be seen that of the deaths which actually took place on the battlefield one in every ten was an officer, an eloquent tribute to the gallantry of those in command, although not perhaps quite so eloquent in praise of their discretion.

When however we look at the figures relating to the deaths from wounds and disease the proportion is found to be only about one in thirty one, seeming to indicate that taken generally, the officers were better able to withstand the rigors of the campaign.

When the returns given above were made up there were 1,713 officers and men in hospital. The following is the record of the number wounded.

The early checks, the temper of the nation, and the final victory are, as it were, recorded in the list of reinforcements which were sent to make up the grand half million men. The despatch was as follows:

The number discharged and disbanded in South Africa were 6,085 of whom 377 were officers.

HOW WILL IT END?

How will the big coal strike end? It cannot go on forever. Will the President interfere or has he the power to interfere? Apparently there is nothing in the laws or constitution of the United States which covers the case. Then, under present conditions, it must be a war to the bitter end, and we believe in a war of this kind the men must lose. However, the United States is greater than the coal kings or the miners, and we believe that if either side does not collapse pretty soon, Congress may take the bull by the horns and pass a law which will open the mines up even if it be found necessary to appropriate them. The people must have coal and the American Government is not going to permit a half dozen men to starve and freeze fully fifty millions of citizens. There must be an end to the strike soon.

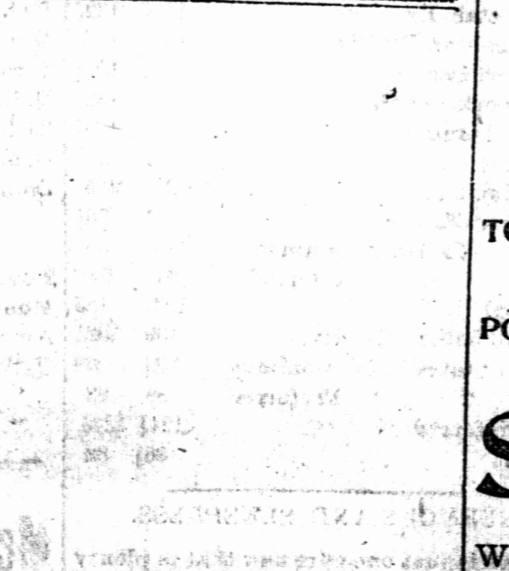
