

Ten Events Lined Up For The Track Tonight

The opening feature of two programs of promising harness racing under lights will get underway at the Exhibition track tonight at 8:10 when ten, one-mile dash events will be held there over Canada's finest raceway.

Commencing on Saturday night at the same hour, a card of nine, one-mile dash events, highlighted by three dashes in the free-for-all trot and two dashes in the free-for-all pace, will wind up the two nights of racing that is expected to produce some of the keenest and fastest track battles to be witnessed over the local track this season.

Heading tonight's list of events will be three dashes in the 2:18 pace with nine starters, two dashes in the number one classified with seven starters, an eight-horse field competing in two dashes in the number two classified, and one dash each in the number three, four and five classified events. The number three and five classified events will each send eight starters up behind the gate while a field of six entries will compete in the number four classified.

Top-notch entries in both pacing and trotting divisions will be represented from leading main-

land and Island racing stables. Tight battles for positions over every inch of the mile distance and driving stretch finishes are expected to be the key-note features of both meets.

Board To Review Fund Campaigns

OTTAWA, July 26 — (CP) — A national philanthropic appeals review board to inform the Canadian people on the worthiness of various campaigns for funds, is to be set up by the major Canadian national health and welfare organizations.

Falcons Take Over Second Place After Trouncing Rovers 9-4

Northwest Falcons moved a rung up the City Baseball League ladder at Memorial Field last evening when they dumped the front-running Northeast Rovers by a count of 9-4 to take over sole possession of second place just half a game behind their last night's opponents.

Playing tight ball in the field behind an eight-hit performance by Cliff Ready, Falcons capitalized on seven errors by Rovers to push home nine runs on only three hits given up by losing moundman Benny Carson. Only one of Falcons runs were of the earned variety, while Rovers had three.

The game was called because of darkness after six complete innings. Falcons scored runs in every inning, chalking up single tallies in the first, fifth and sixth, and double-run rallies in the second, third and fourth. They only had one miscue.

Rovers scored with singles in the second, third, fourth and sixth innings.

Right fielder Billy Purcell of Rovers swung the heavy bat with a double and two singles in three trips to the plate for a perfect 1000 average, while pitcher Carson of Rovers ran him a close second with two for three, both Texas leaguers. Second-sacker Billy Hood of Rovers collected the only other two-base hit of the game.

On their night's performances, moundman Carson struck out nine batters, gave up five bases on balls, hit three batters, and tossed two wild pitches, while Ready struck out three, gave up

one free trip to first on balls and chalked up one wild pitch.

The Charlottetown Golf Club's Belvedere course will be the scene for the three leading annual events in Maritime championship golfing competitions on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of next week. The three big events will be the Maritime Amateur, Maritime Junior and Maritime Professional golf championships, that will bring together the cream of fairway and green experts in all divisions from the far corners of the three seaside Provinces.

Visiting shot makers, including such well-known artists as defending champion Maurice "Mousey" Dowling, representing Moncton, Ben Isnor of the same club, Pete Kelly of Fredericton, two-time championship winner, and Eddie Crowell of Halifax, another former champion, and a host of other top-flight golfers, will be arriving in this Garden Province over the week-end preparatory to the opening competitions on Monday. Officials of the local Club report the course in ideal condition and that no local competitions will be scheduled during Saturday and Sunday to hold the course open for practice routes to the tournament entries. T.K. "Tom" Stewart of St. Stephen, N.B., who won the N.B.-P.E.I. amateur crown at St. John last week, is also expected to be on hand to contest Maritime honors. The border-town entry shot a gross 301 in the 72-hole competition, only one stroke behind Archie Skinner of St. Andrews, N.B., winner of the professional and open titles in the N.B.-P.E.I. play at Saint John.

The amateur competitions will get underway on Monday with a 18-hole qualifying round that will place the first 32 players in the championship division and match play eliminations will commence on Tuesday. Players losing their first round match will play the consolation championship of their division. Final matches in all divisions will be played on Thursday with 36 holes in championship play and 18 holes in second and following divisions and consolations.

Play in junior championship competition will also be held on Monday with contenders competing in 36-hole stroke play for the Nova Scotia Golf Association Trophy. Leading junior entries expected to take part from local circles include Roger Clarke, Doug Cameron and Karl Reardon. Clarke, who is the present holder of the Charlottetown Club junior title, led the qualifying round here this week in defense of his title again this year. Cameron and Reardon are his closest competitors for club honors this year and were close behind the defending champ in the recent qualifying round. All three should be well up in the running in the forthcoming Maritime play.

The professional golfers will hold the spotlight on Wednesday and Thursday when they tee-off in the opening 36-hole play of the 72-hole competitions on Wednesday and their final 36 holes the following day. Charlottetown Club professional, Marc Sandow, and Cecil Bubby Dowling, pro at the Green Gables course at Cavendish are expected to be two of the Island leading contenders in the professional division. Both competed in the N.B.-P.E.I. professional and open competitions at Saint John last week.

Officials of the sponsoring club for the annual Maritime tournaments, are working overtime in every department to make the event one of the best, both competitively and socially, and should compare favourably with other events of its kind held during the long history of the annual competitions. The club is offering a cordial welcome to all golfing enthusiasts to come out and watch the matches and enjoy the fine calibre of top-notch golfing displays that are expected to be enacted there during the four days of competitions. It will be golf at its best in Maritime circles.

Red Sox Overpower Chicago 13-10, Indians Hand Yanks 9-4 Beating

Clutch-hitting specialist Clyde Volmer lashed his third homer of the game, a three-run clout, Thursday to give Boston Red Sox a 13-10 victory over Chicago White Sox.

The triumph pulled the Sox to within a shade of the American League's front-running New York Yankees.

The Yanks, who lost to Cleveland 9-4, have won 55 and lost 35 for a percentage of .6101.

Boston has won 56 and lost 36. Volmer, whose timely hitting has kept the Red Sox high in the pennant fight for the last three weeks, hit his 17th circuit blow of the season off Harry Dorish to break a 10-10 deadlock in the sixth inning. That game-winning blow came with Bobby Doerr and Billy Goodman on base.

In the previous frame Volmer put his forces back in the contention by homering off Randy Gumpert.

His first four-bagger was at the expense of Luis Aloma, the second of four Chicago flingers. It climaxed a Red Sox five-run first-inning rally.

Dom Dimaggio and Ted Williams also hit for the circuit as the Red Sox put on a 17-hit barrage.

Eddie Robinson did the same thing for the White Sox. The latter's came with two on base in the second inning and moved the White Sox into a 7-5 lead.

When Ellis Kinder, who now boasts a 7-1 record, appeared with two out and two on in the sixth, he struck himself in a 10-10 tie. He struck out Phil Masi to retire the side. Before Kinder came in the fourth-place White Sox bet-labored Willard Nixon, Bill Wight and Chuck Stobbs as if they owned the Sox 12 of their 14 hits.

It took Cleveland Indians exactly 12 months and 12 days to win a game at Yankee Stadium. They did it in their 14th attempt by climbing over former teammate Allie Reynolds in six innings for a 9-4 victory.

Reynolds had beaten the Indians four straight before today. He shut them out three times and held them nameless and hitless the last time he faced them.

Cleveland collected 13 hits, three each by Dale Mitchell and Ray Boone. Mitchell batted in three runs with a homer and two singles. Bobby Avila, who hit safely in his 10th straight game, drove in two mates with a single and 400-foot triple.

The Yankees suffered their worst defensive day of the season, committing five errors, two by second-baseman Gerry Coleman. Four of Cleveland's tallies were unearned.

Bob Feller, the victim of Reynolds' 1-0 no hitter, got some measure of revenge when he was awarded the victory although he was forced to retire because of the oppressive heat after working five innings. He yielded all the Yankee runs and all but the big blow, nine hits. Lefty Lou Brissie hurled the last four frames for the Indians and held the Yankees to a lone single. The victory was the 15th of the season for Feller, tops in the majors. The great right-hander now has a lifetime total of 223 wins which ties him with Mel Harder for the most recorded by a Cleveland pitcher.

Yanks scored two in the fourth on successive homers by Johnny Mize and Cliff Mages.

They got two more in the fifth on Gene Woodling's single and Yogi Berra's 15th home run.

Detroit jumped on relief pitcher Mickey Harris for three runs in the eighth inning and defeated Washington 6-3. Connie Berry's twelfth double was the big blow.

It was two of three for Detroit in the series, and turned back a Washington bid to take over fifth place.

Dizzy Trout, third Tiger moundman, was the winning pitcher, his fourth victory against 11 losses.

Burly Don Newcombe pitched his ninth straight victory over Chicago Cubs as Brooklyn Dodgers pounded out a 9-1 triumph.

The National League leaders' sixth straight victory was also the eighth in a row for Newcombe who has won 14 and lost four this season.

Held to one run and three hits by Omar Lown the first six innings, the Dodgers shook loose for three runs in the seventh to rout Lown.

They added two off relief hurler Johnny Klippstein and Joe Hatten.

Gil Hodges and Billy Cox paced Brooklyn's 12-hit attack with three apiece.

Boston Braves pounded out a 6-2 victory over the slumping Cincinnati Reds to move into fifth place.

Vern Bickford held the local club to four hits until the ninth inning. Then he was relieved after two runners had scored.

Bickford got credit for his 11th victory of the season, however, as against seven setbacks. Ewell Blackwell was the losing hurler—his 10th defeat against nine victories.

Bob Elliott of the Braves hit his 12th home run of the season in the second inning.

Sam Jethroe and Earl Torgeson each stole two bases. Jethroe now has stolen 21 bases to his credit.

The 79th Annual Provincial Rifle Association Prize Meet will open its four days of competitions here on Monday morning at the Squaw Point Range near Tea Hill that will bring together the best marksmen in the Province to shoot it out for leading Provincial honors and a place on the P.R.A. team that will go to Ottawa later this summer to compete in Dominion competition.

Timing up their sights for 10 shots from the 200 yard range at 8:30, riflemen will swing into action in the DeBols Brothers Match that will set the annual prize meet underway.

Other matches to be held during opening day will be the Prowse Brothers Match, 10 rounds at 300 yards, the Moore and McLeod Match, 10 rounds at 500 yards, and the Cameron-Vinnicombe Match of 10 rounds from the 600 yard range.

George McLennan of Alexandria will be defending his championship for the third successive year in both the Grand and Ottawa aggregates. Mr. McLennan is a brother of Miss Mary McLennan who is at present making such a fine showing with the Canadian team at Bisley, England, as the first Commonwealth woman to ever compete in the annual rifle classic.

The leading rifle attraction in annual Provincial competition, this year's event is expected to be one of its best in history. Nearly 60 competitors have already filed entry and a much larger total than that is expected before the meeting gets underway.

The highest 22 shots in the Ottawa Aggregate, eight of which must be Tyros, will comprise the Provincial team to compete later at Ottawa in D.C.R.A. competition, plus the five highest cadet shots.
