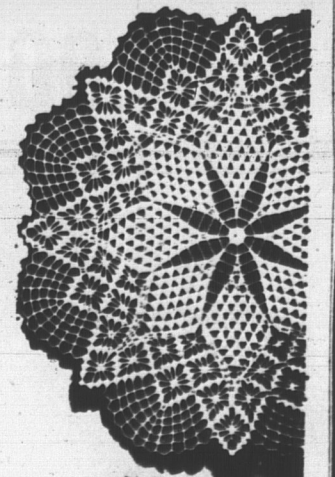

Beef And Bean Casserole - Buffet Supper Starrer

What does the term "country-style" mean when applied to a buffet supper?

It means "old-fashioned" with plenty of food on the table. Bring out grandmother's checked or otherwise colored tablecloth. Arrange a center piece of bitter-sweet berries button chrysanthemums or other seasonal flowers.

Table Necessities

Add great-grandmother's candlesticks the necessary dishes and tableware and stemmed compote dishes filled with your best preserve and pickles.

Arrange all the food for supper on the table the big casserole of beans in the place of honor. Light the candles and - "Come in folks supper's ready."

Ham-Roll Saladettes - Beef and Lima Bean Bake Bread-and-Butter Pickles Crisp Celery Carrot Sticks - Currant Jelly Rhubarb Conserve - Hot Tea Biscuits (standard recipe or Ready-to-Bake) - Latticed Pie - Coffee - Tea Milk - Measurements level; Recipes for 6

HAM-ROLL SALADETTES

3/4 c. creamed cottage cheese
1 tsp. drained pickle relish
1 tsp. grated sharp cheese (any kind)

1/2 tsp. table-mustard
1 tsp. mayonnaise
6 thin slices cooked smoked ham

12 Romaine lettuce leaves
12 strips pimiento 1 1/2" x 1/2"

1-3 c. not-sweet French dressing

Combine and mix first 5 ingredients. Center 2 tsp. of mixture on each slice of ham. Spread almost to the edge. Roll up; fasten each with toothpick; chill; fold-side down.

To serve, place each ham-roll in a little "container" made by slipping one romaine leaf into the other. Top each ham-roll with 2 strips pimiento. Pass not-sweet French dressing.

BEEF AND LIMA BEAN BAKE

1 lb. dried lima beans
1/2 tsp. baking soda
1 lb. lean stewing beef cut in bite-size pieces

2 sliced peeled good-size onions
2 tsp. bacon drippings
3 tsp. flour

1 1/2 tsp. seasoned salt
1/2 tsp. ground cumin
1/2 tsp. pepper
1 c. drained canned tomato

Boiling water to cover, about 3 c.

Turn dried limas into 2 qt. kettle. Cover with boiling water; let stand 30 min.; then drain; put lid on kettle, let stand 50 min.; then drain. Add baking soda and fresh boiling water to cover. Simmer-boil 1 1/2 hrs.

Meantime, in 10" frypan, saute beef and sliced onions in bacon drippings, until light-brown. Stir in flour and seasonings.

Drain beans; discard liquid. Arrange beans in 2 1/2-qt. casserole in alternating layers with tomato and beef-onion mixture. Add boiling water, almost covering. Cover and bake 2 hrs. at 325 to 350 degrees F. or until both beans and meat are fork-tender.

THE CHEF'S HOT MUSHROOM TURNOVERS FOR HORS D'OEUVRES

Ingredients: 1 recipe flaky pastry (homemade or a mix); 2 tsp. butter; 2 c. small-sliced mushroom tops and thin-sliced mushroom tops and thin-sliced crosswise peeled stems; 1/2 tsp. seasoned salt; 1-16 tsp. nutmeg; 1/2 tsp. flour; 1 egg yolk; 1/4 lb. cold water.

To Make: Mix pastry; refrigerate until ready to use. Melt butter in 9" frypan. Stir in mushroom tops. Add seasoned salt and nutmeg; slow-saute 5 min., stirring with fork. Stir in flour; and cook-stir 2 min. Cool.

On lightly floured surface, roll flaky-pastry into oblong shape, a scant 1/4" thick. Cut into 8 (4" squares or 12 (3") squares. Center each layer-square with 1/2 tsp. mushroom filling (smaller squares with 1 tsp.) Fold over pastry to make triangles, pressing edges together with fork. Place on baking sheet. Mix egg-yolk smooth with water. Brush over turnovers.

Bake 15 to 20 min. or until golden brown in hot oven, 400 degrees F. Serve warm. Makes 8 large or 12 small turnovers.
