

Famishing for Food.

TERRIBLE STATE OF AFFAIRS IN DROUGHT-STRICKEN TEXAS—OVER 4000 FAMILIES DESTITUTE AND STARVING.

The Fort Worth, Texas Gazette has made the following estimate of the number of destitute families in the drought-stricken region of Texas.

From several counties no figures have yet been obtained, and in the estimate given above, the figures are in every county smaller than the number reported by the county judges' convention. In speaking of the situation, the Gazette makes an appeal for aid for the sufferers, and says: "There is privation and want in certain counties that demand immediate relief, and the truth concerning it should be told in the interest of suffering humanity. The truth will not only result in giving bread to those who need it, but it will extract the mischief from any exaggeration. But for the wholesale falsehood that people in Texas were suffering by the hundreds of thousands, those who were actuated by selfish interests would not have been able to create the impression that no suffering at all existed. Strong men, who would go away to other localities in search of work, dread to leave wives and babies in their homes without bread. Men who have homes paid for grow desperate, and consider whether they shall carry their helpless families to the country seat and leave them as paupers to be cared for while they seek work and money and bread wherever among other communities they may be found. All these counties are not suffering in the same degree and to the same extent, but there is general need, and some privation, so intense and without aid, without some recognition of common humanity, there may go out in the world a story of more bitter shame and greater hurt to the state than any which has been exaggerated in the past."
